Unit I: What is Literature?

Sample texts may be selected from:

- Feature article in a magazine (to be selected by the course instructor)
- Print Advertisement (to be selected by the course instructor)
- Newspaper article(to be selected by the course instructor)
- Comic strip (examples may be selected from Garfield, Calvin and Hobbes, Dennis the Menace)
- Fairy tale/ myth: "Cinderella" or "Little Red Riding Hood"/ "The Judgement of Paris" (excerpt from Edith Hamilton, Mythology)
- Popular literature: Excerpt from Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban
- Poem: Yeats: "He Wishes for the Cloths of Heaven"
- Excerpt from a novel: Oliver Twist (from Ch 2: Oliver asks for more)
- Excerpt from a drama: Act I of *The Importance of Being Earnest* (Jack's proposal to Gwendolen) or a monologue: Shakespeare: "All the world's a stage" (As You Like It)
- Excerpt from a literary/ critical essay: David Cecil: "Reading As One of the Fine Arts"
