







PREFACE

A host of seven Belgian Jesuits arrived at Calcutta in November 1859, under the leadership of Fr. H. Depelchin (Rector: 1860-1871), the Founding Father of the second St. Xavier's. They shifted St.Xavier's from Chowringhee to the Sans Souci Theatre in January1860, which is now the honest home of learned professors and zealous students.

With one hundred and fifty six years of service to the nation, St. Xavier's College, Kolkata, has grown today into a leading educational institution in India. Both St. Xavier's School and College are proud of their contribution to the cause of education and culture in Bengal for 156 years. These twin institutions have produced many great educationists and students who earned regard and respect for their Alma Mater.

The National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) recognized St. Xavier's College as an "A" grade institution in 2003. In May 2006, it was declared a Centre with Potential for Excellence by the UGC. From July 2006, it became an autonomous college (the first in West Bengal). In November 2011, the college was assessed by NAAC as an Autonomous College and was awarded an A grade with CGPA 3.53 on 4.00 point scale.

St. Xavier's has over these 156 years remained steadfast and persevered in the midst of troubles and anxieties. Now with all the richness of the past, it embraces the future with the same spirit- "Nihil Ultra" (Nothing beyond). The College is devoted to the mission of forming young men and women of competence, commitment, conscience and compassion for the greater glory of God.

It is a great opportunity for the institution to apply for the third cycle of NAAC accreditation.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

St. Xavier's College, the first Autonomous College in the State of West Bengal is applying for the re-accreditation in its 3rd Cycle. Accredited by NAAC as a Grade 'A' College in 2003, re-accredited in 2011 with grade 'A', with a CGPA of 3.53 in the scale of 4, St. Xavier's College was granted the status of an Autonomous College in March 2006 and was conferred with the honour of 'College with Potential for Excellence' (CPE) in May 2006 by UGC. The College was conferred with the honour of 'College of Excellence' (CE) in April 2014.

St. Xavier's started functioning as an Autonomous College under the University of Calcutta from July 01, 2006. On that day, His Excellency, the then Governor of West Bengal and the Chancellor of the University of Calcutta, Shri Gopal Krishna Gandhi declared St. Xavier's College as an Autonomous College in a solemn function held in the College premises. The Autonomous status granted in 2006 offered the College an opportunity to bring innovation in teaching, learning, research, evaluation and extension services.

Principled on the motto "NIHIL ULTRA" meaning "NOTHING BEYOND" and with the vision to promote a society based on love, freedom, liberty, justice, equality and fraternity, St. Xavier's College aims to form young men and women of competence, commitment, compassion and conscience – men and women for others. This is the ideology of Jesuit Education. This enables the students to herald the social change – national and global.

The various advancements that have been carried out since the second re-accreditation of November 2011 are summed up briefly under the seven criteria.

The various thrusts of the College as presented in the seven criteria are:

- **♣** Quest for excellence emphasis on quality education.
- **♣** Contributing to national development by forming men and women for others.
- **★** Fostering and rewarding research.
- Fostering global competence among students.
- ♣ Promoting the use of technologies.
- **♣** Inculcating a value system among students.
- Promotion of a transparent and participatory governance.
- Ongoing promotion of new innovative practices to make the institution relevant in its mission as an agent of social transformation.



CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECT

The College aims to inculcate the highest intellectual standards through rigorous academic commitment and discipline. Students are inspired to aspire to higher level of academic achievement by mastering the subjects they have chosen to study. These are in tune with the goals and objectives of the institution which are made available to its stakeholders through the College website, the College calendar and prospectus.

The College conducts various courses in three shifts. It offers a wide range of programmes providing adequate academic flexibility in the choice of core and ancillary options. In UG level there are 17 Honours courses and one B.A. General Course. Each Honours course of B.A. and B.Sc. has three ancillary options amongst which two are to be chosen. B.Com. and B.B.A. are integrated Honours courses with options for specialization in the final year.

Raghabpur Campus as part of vision 2020 – A significant achievement with regard to extension activities of St. Xavier's College (Autonomous) is the setting up of Raghabpur Campus. Raghabpur in South 24 Parganas, about 25 kms away from the main Park Street campus, caters primarily to the academic needs of the rural students. A sprawling green campus with the main building and other associated facilities, the Raghabpur campus offers courses in BA General, B. Com Honours and Bengali Honours to students since July 2014. Students of the Raghabpur Campus are integrally connected with diverse activities of the main campusas well as special programmes organized and held in Raghabpur campus itself. Another component of academic expansion in the Raghabpur campus is the introduction of the course in History Honoursfrom July, 2015.

There are 5 Post Graduate (PG)degree courses and two integrated five year M.Sc. Biotechnology and Multimedia and Animation (with an exit option at the end of 3rd year) course. All courses are co-educational except for the B.Com. (Morning) which is only for boys. From July 2010, a Bachelor course in Multimedia with specialization in Animation (BMM) in the UG level and M.Sc. Microbiology course in the PG level have been introduced. In July 2006, the College had introduced five certificate courses and two diploma courses under Career Oriented Programme. As of now, 1 diploma (one year), 3 certificate courses and 5 post graduate diploma courses (One year) are being offered.

The Department of Performing Arts has been conducting a Certificate Course on Performing Arts since July 2011. The course initially consisted of two semesters and consisted of twice a week classes for the B. A./ B. Sc. students. The students were awarded certificates on successful completion of the course and 4 extracurricular credits. The Course was discontinued from July 2014-January 2015 due to renovation of the Jubilee Building rooftop. The Course was restructured into a six month certificate course and a 2 extracurricular credit course and commenced again from July 2015. A total of 22 students from B.A. / B.Sc./ BBA / B.Com have successfully completed the course in 2015.

Curriculum restructuring is a continuous process. The College has a Curriculum Restructuring Committee to oversee the process. While restructuring, feedback from all stakeholders are analyzed and appropriate actions are taken for improvement.



Through consultations with experts from academic and industrial domains, curriculum and relevance of the programmesand curriculum are ensured. Multi skill development programmes help in employability. Training through internships, project work, Career Oriented Programmes and participation in various society activities help to develop leadership skills and competence.

A major restructuring occurred in 2013, with Departments of BA and BSC introducing 18 papers in the Honours course with 6 ancillarypapers for the students studying an Honours programme.

After every semester, the academic audit of each department is conducted by the respective Board of Studies (BOS) and the overall audit of the College is done by the Academic Council with the help of the external experts. At the end of three years, with feedback from stakeholders and the experience gained during the three years, the BOS of every department undertakes a thorough revision of the syllabi to make it contemporary and more relevant.

The College ensures participation of all students in extra and co-curricular activities through NSS, NCC, AICUF, LTS, Sports, various cultural and departmental societies and Extension Programmes. A student has to earn six non-academic credits to complete the under graduate degree courses (four non-academic credits with effect from July 2014), one of which has to be earned through social work in order to inculcate social awareness and commitment. Since July 2014 two-credit foundation courses have been introduced on inter-religious studies and personality development. The B. Ed. Course has two non-academic credits and two credits for inter-religious and Ignatian Pedagogy Paradigm (IPP).

CRITERION II: TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The College stands committed to make teaching and learning "Student-Centric" which makes the students to think, analyze, be independent, original and creative. Their individual needs are properly addressed. The College ensures the competence of staff and helps the faculty to develop continuously. It promotes social awareness among students leading to commitment and action and ensures a just and scientific evaluation process.

The admission process is online, complying with all the government norms pertaining to religious minority institutions. The College admits students of different backgrounds and with varying abilities – rich and poor, urban and rural, SC, ST, Minority and differently-abled students. There is no gender discrimination.

Special considerations are given to the financially weak and disadvantaged students through fee concessions/scholarships, free hostel accommodation and free text books from the book bank. Infrastructural facilities like ramps, lifts, and wheel chairs are provided to the differently-abled students.

The teaching-learning process being student-centric, the curriculum endeavors to integrate knowledge with skill which will sustain an environment of learning and creativity. Learning methods encourage students' participation through project work, field work based projects, action research, case study, classroom seminars by the students, microteaching, internships, guided library work, training in relevant software and e-learning. Teaching innovations through modern teaching aids and ICT facilities make the learning process more student-friendly.

The faculty is recruited through a selection process in accordance with the directives of the State Government for minority institutions. Apart from the substantive posts sanctioned by the State Government, the College recruits additional faculty under management posts created and funded by the College, for both aided and self-financing courses. The faculty is highly competent and dedicated.

Evaluation processes are clearly communicated to the newly admitted students. There is a system of double evaluation. Redressal mechanism in the form of review of the answer script by a third examiner ensures just and fair evaluation. The answer scripts are coded to keep the identity of the students confidential. The marking scheme is made jointly by the external and internal examiners for uniformity in evaluation. There is a provision for the students to see their answer scripts.

The academic progress of the students is monitored through Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) in its various components.

Identification of slow and advanced learners is made by the faculty on the basis of classroom interactions. Remedial and tutorial classes are arranged for slow and differently-abled learners. Advanced learners are encouraged to present papers in seminars and conferences, and attend research institutes during summer recess for projects.

From the feedback obtained from the various stakeholders and the experience of the faculty, the Boards of Studies of different departments restructure and update the syllabi every three years so as to make it contemporary and relevant.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

St. Xavier's believes that an institution can become a center of academic excellence only when a research culture exists and proliferates amongst faculty and students. The College plays a very proactive role in promoting this culture. The faculty is encouraged to pursue and complete doctoral and post-doctoral work for which they are granted study-leave with full pay. The faculty is recognized and rewarded during the Convocation function on completion of their PhD.

A Central Research Facility has been set up in the College to assist research activities. There is budgetary allocation for the above.SXC has DSIR Certificate, only given to research institutes. St. Xavier's is a DBT Star College. St. Xavier's College Educational Trust has the provision of 35 (1) and(2) of the Income Tax Act of 1961. Seed money as adjustable advance is provided to initiate research projects. The faculty is granted special leave for attending conferences to present papers. The College management provides financial assistance in the form of TA, Registration fees etc. The library is equipped with a large number of research journals for the faculty. Both PG and UG students participate in research programmes organized by various Universities, Research Institutes and Organizations.

The institution encourages research projects and publications by the faculty. Since June 2010, 861research papers have been authored / co-authored by the faculty, published in different national and international journals. The faculty authored / co-authored 76number of books.30projects amounting to about Rs. 2.83crores have been completed and 25projects of about Rs. 3.78crore are going on. Faculty members are acting as guides and co-guides of 25 research scholars pursuing their PhD programmes. The institution publishes its annual research journals "Aviskaar" and "Magis". Many departments publish their departmental magazines coordinated by student groups, supervised by members of the faculty.

Students actively participate in research, seminars, paper presentations and publications.

St. Xavier's College is the only General Degree College in India with a responsibility of managing an Educational Multi Media Research Centre (EMMRC) of UGC. Established in 1986, the EMMRC is one of the best centers in the country and has won many awards. In the year 2015, 184 Electronic Television(ETV) programmes have been produced with a total duration of 72 Hours 27 minutes. Besides those ETV programmes, in 2015 the center has developed 114 e-contents and 307 Learning Object Repository (LORs) on Microbiology based on the model syllabus prescribed by UGC for undergraduate students.

The expertise and specialized knowledge base of faculty helps in consultancy service. Course material for Environmental Science of West Bengal University of Technology was prepared by the Departments of Microbiology and Environmental Science. Consultancy services were offered by the faculty to Rasoi Banaspati, Calcutta Laminating Industries, Agri Solutions Pvt. Ltd., Chemico Process Pvt. Ltd., Ennovate Global and UNICEF programme on sanitation. Innovative Research tools are being



developed by the B. Com and BBA students of St. Xavier's under Enactus and EDC for the socially marginalized.

Community and extension service is integrated with the curriculum as extended opportunities to help, serve and learn. Students have to earn one nonacademic credit (30 hours) through community service. Field Trips, Village Camps, Blood Donation Camps, regular visit to Old Age Homes and imparting elementary education to under privileged children in villages as part of the "PRAYAS" initiative, make students aware of their social responsibility and commitment. Villages have been adopted where reconstruction, rehabilitation and other civic amenities have been provided. A full time Director of NSS and Social Work co-ordinates all social activities.

The College runs the programme 'Earn while you learn'. Unique to our institution are the programmes of 'Shishu Mela' and 'College to Village and Village to College'.

Collaborative research has been taken up by the faculty members with some Universities and Research Institutes. The department of Physics has a collaborative programme with Bose Institute at the M.Sc. level. Department of Microbiology has twinned with Manitoba University of Canada.

The College has been successfully running international and national student exchange programmes. The College also has faculty exchange programmes with international and national collaborators. A course on 'Science and Religion' is conducted in collaboration with Santa Clara University, USA.

The Career Oriented Programmes have linkages with various organizations like National Stock Exchange and Fact International. The Entrepreneurship Development Cell trains students for entrepreneurship (called EDP) in collaboration with DST.

The College promotes campuscleanliness drive among students and neighborhood surveys are undertaken by the NSS. The entire campus is a 'No Smoking' and 'No



Plastic' zone. The College has introduced the use of Solar Energy and Rain Water Harvesting as environment friendly projects.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The College monitors the adequacy and optimum use of facilities available in the institution to maintain the quality of academic and other programmes. In the last five years about 50,000 square feet space has been added to the College infrastructure. The Jubilee Building with G+3 floors was inaugurated in 2009. All of these have led to additional classrooms, Central Research Facility room, a well-equipped Central Library etc. A new wing for the Biotechnology department with audio-visual facilities has been added. With the above space there has been a rapid expansion of the various departments and offices. The Controller of Examinations office has been shifted to the first floor to provide more space and improved infrastructure.

For meeting future developments, expansion has been planned and executed. The EMMRC will be shifted to the EM Bypass campus. With an additional third floor in the erstwhile Park Street Hostel building, 32000 sq. ft. (approx.) of space has been added and is being used by the Department of Education and Central Library. A guest house at Salt Lake has become functional from 2013 to accommodate the visiting faculty members. Two separate hostels for boys and girls respectively have been constructed at AJC Bose Road with 220% increase in the intake of students. The boys' hostel (Fr. Leeming Hostel for Boys) was inaugurated in July 2014 and the girls' hostel (Mother Teresa Hostel for Girls) in July 2015. The Department of Education has shifted to the old hostel building in June 2015 along with the relocation of the Central Library, thus leaving space for use in the main building. The development of the infrastructure and the physical facilities available thus keep pace with the overall development of the institution. The addition of Raghabpur Campus has enabled admission of rural students and thereby helped in the creation of further space for academic expansion.

There is an effective mechanism for the maintenance of the infrastructure facilities. The College has a full-fledged maintenance department under Fr. Minister who is the administrator. There is a full time maintenance manager with an assistant and full time electricians, plumbers, carpenters, sweepers and gardeners. The College has a well-established carpentry workshop.

Library software – ILMS KOHA (Version 3.14), the computers, equipment and other network facilities are under the Annual Maintenance Contract. A "System In-charge" takes care of the daily maintenance of the ICT facilities.

The institution has an excellent library and computer facilities with easy access to all its constituents. With 12,000 square feet of carpet area and a little over 57, 162 text books and reference books with 95, 513 e-books are available in Central Library. The library is accessible from 7 am to 7.30 pm. Spacious reading room, open access to the stacks, reprographic/audio/video facilities, CD/DVDs, access to e-learning, INFLIBNET, DELNET, Foreign and Indian research journals/magazines and research cubicles with internet connections cater to the needs of students and staff.

Both Raghabpur and St. Lawrence campus are equipped with Library and Computer laboratory facilities.



ICT facilities are adequately available in the institution for academic purposes. There are <u>687</u> desktops and <u>30</u> laptops in the College. The departments have their own computer facilities with <u>39</u> desktops for departmental works. Apart from computer facilities in PG departments, there are Central Computer Laboratories with <u>233</u> computers having internet connection facilities. 28 MBPS leased line for internet access is extended to the entire campus. Campus networking is with Fiber Optic backbone. All classrooms are equipped with audio visual facilities. The College also has a Cyber Room with 51 Computers with internet and printing facilities catering to the needs of the students.

There are a host of other support facilities available on the campus. An airconditioned Auditorium with a capacity to accommodate 600 people having modern lighting and acoustic system is available. A mini auditorium (Fr. Arupe Hall) with a capacity of 150 at a time is also available for use for different activities. The Department of Education has a hall which can house 200 persons. The Jubilee hall has a capacity of 250. The Raghabpur Campus and the St. Lawrence campus have hall and auditorium respectively. Besides the auditorium the College main campus is equipped with a number of additional halls such as Rohinton Kapadia Central Hall with 17 cubicles in the mezzanine floor of the hall and the Xavier Hall with a capacity of 200. There are two play fields for outdoor games along with a floodlit basketball court. The College canteen accommodates 100 students at a time; there is a separate enclosure for staff members. The canteen remains operational from 7 am to 7 pm. Wash rooms on each floor for boys and girls, drinking water facility attached with water purifiers are available, a girls' common room on the second floor and a Students' common room with indoor game facility on the ground floor are available. Raghabpur campus also has a separate common room for girls.

The College has been provided with two transformers by CESC for sufficient supply of electricity. There are two generators – one for offices and the other for classrooms. The College will soon be provided with the Feeder line by CESC for uninterrupted supply of electricity.

The institution utilizes its infrastructure facilities from 6 am to 8.30 pm in the most optimal way to conduct the 3 shifts of classes.

The institution has a well-equipped infirmary, which provides necessary health care facilities. There is a panel of doctors who visit the College on call to attend to emergency situations. The infirmary has round-the-clock trained nurses and attendants. For differently-abled students, infrastructural facilities like ramp, lift and wheel-chairs and washrooms are available.

A small well-laid-out garden with tree plantation and greenery with a lush green cover on the playground contribute to the ambience of the surroundings.

The College makes an earnest and extensive effort to provide necessary assistance to students for facilitating their holistic progression. On an average more than 50% of the students pursue higher education in institutes of national repute such as TIFR, IISc, ISI, IITs, IIM's and other Universities. The PG students go for their Doctoral work in research institutes such as HRI, SNBCNS, IIMSc (Chennai) etc. The commerce students go for ICAI (Chartered Institute), ICSI, ICAI (Cost Institute) and different reputed business schools. Students of the Department of Education go for M.Ed. degree. Students go to summer schools in Foreign Universities. Thus there is an appreciable vertical movement of students from one level of education to the next higher level.

The institution makes effort to facilitate progression towards gainful employment. The internship of B.Com /BBA students in different industries help to establish contacts. Career Oriented Courses and soft skill training equip the students for technical vocations. The Entrepreneur Development Cell conducts Awareness Camps to train students for entrepreneurship.

There are facilitating mechanisms to support students. Special admission consideration is given to students who are outstanding in sports and NCC. Guidance and counselling is provided by all faculty members toweaker students. Mentoring, Remedial classes and tutorial classes are also offered to students. The Counselling Center provides counselling services to the students in the form of personal and vocational guidance. The Women's Cell of the College provides counselling to women students. There is an active Placement Cell which ensures on and off campus recruitment drive. Between 2010-2015,2033 students were recruited by various companies and institutions, both national and international.

Alumni/ae provides assistance in the placement of students and organizes various programmes for both past and present students. They also contribute substantially to the scholarship fund of the College. Welfare measures are in the form of scholarships, fee concessions, hostel accommodation, Book Bank facilities, medical support and infrastructural support to differently-abled students. There is a Grievance Redressal Cell which is vested with the authority to arbitrate any type of grievances raised by the students. The Anti-Ragging Committee and Committee against Sexual Harassment protect the rights of the students in the respective areas of concern. The SC/ST and Minority Cell ensures service to the relevant students.

There are many associations and societies under the Students' Council which organize academic and co-curricular programmes for students throughout the year. Extracurricular and co-curricular activities are strongly encouraged by members of the faculty. Students have to earn upto six credits from these activities; at least one of these credits (30 hours) has to be earned through social/community service. The motive of earning credit hours encourages students to participate in cultural activities organized by the various student societies/student associations and departments. Participation in these activities helps to develop various skills of the students and to foster holistic personality development.



Feedbacks from studentson Faculty, Syllabi and Infrastructureare taken in the form of questionnaire which help to improve the academic standards and infrastructural facilities of the College. Xaverian Parliament, an open forum, allows the student representatives to voice their observations on various issues of the College through interaction with the Principal and Vice Principals.

There is a apolitical Students' Council which takes care of students' welfare. It is the activity center of the students which promote co-curricular and extracurricular functions. It is run by the students' body elected through a democratic process.

The College encourages 'earning while learning' by employing some of the students in the offices and the canteen outside class hours.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

The vision, mission and goals of the institution are achieved through strategic action plan, schedule for future development, effective leadership and participative decision-making process. Based on the philosophy of Jesuit education, the College aspires to follow the Jesuit paradigm of AMDG (for the greater glory of God) and "MAGIS" (for the better / greater) in all aspects of teaching, learning, evaluation, research and extension services. Breaking the barrier between urban and rural students, the College strives to spread education to everyone. Special focus is given to those belonging to the marginalized sections of society irrespective of caste, creed, religion and gender.

The Principal is the Head of the institution. He delegates responsibilities to the Vice Principals (VPs), Deans, Heads of Departments (HODs), Controller of Examinations(COE) and faculty members. He guides, assists and co-ordinates the implementation of various decisions. Accountability and transparency in the execution of duties is central to the administration at St. Xavier's College. Faculty is intimately and organically involved in the decision-making process. Lay leadership and participation is promoted by the Jesuit management. All academic and policy decisions are taken in consultation with the faculty members. All administrative bodies have faculty representation. Thus academic and administrative planning in the institution is well coordinated.

The Provincial, who is also the President of the Governing Body visits the college annually. He visits the College sometime in October/November, meets the administration, staff and students. At the end of the visitation he presents a verbal and a written Memoriale(report) to the Principal.

At the beginning of the academic year, various departments and the members of administration scrutinize the work load and assess the need for staff recruitment and other infrastructural requirements. This is further scrutinized by the Principal. New recruitments are done through a selection process satisfying the government criteria for both substantive posts and College created posts. The Founder body and Governing body have decided to follow a uniform pattern of salary for all teachers. The institution has a self-appraisal method to evaluate the performance of the faculty in teaching, research and extension programmes. Skill up-gradation and training programmes are conducted for the non-teaching staff members when required. The College organizes Orientation and Faculty Development Programmes twice a year. The faculty is encouraged for research and project work leading to their academic development. Thus the management of human resource is meticulously planned and executed.

Effective efforts are also undertaken for resource mobilization. The main sources of grants are the State Government and the UGC. This apart, Alumni/ae contribute substantially towards institutional development. Renting of College infrastructure and facilities, donation from various sources are the other significant forms of income. The Societies and Associations raise their own resources for their programmes, 15% of which is contributed to the scholarship fund. The Students' Council every year



contributes a dedicated fund for the development of the College. The students' fees and various COP courses contribute to resource mobilization. In the year 2014-15, the quantum of resources mobilized through donation were about Rupees 10,30,87,773.

The operating budget of the institution is adequate to cover day to day expenses. The budget is sufficient to take care of the maintenance of infrastructure. At the beginning of each financial year, the finance committee meets for budget allocation under different heads. The budget is sent for approval to the Governing Body and the Founder Body. Periodic review of the budget expenses is made for optimal utilization. There is an internal auditor appointed by the College for internal audit. Further, external audit is done in every financial year. Thus, the available resource is optimally allocated and utilized through efficient financial resource management.

The dynamic leadership of the Principal, the active participation of the Staff, both teaching and support, in academics and administration together with effective internal coordination and monitoring by IQAC make it possible for the institution to achieve its goals.

The College classrooms are utilized by other organizations to conduct competitive examinations on Sundays and holidays. IGNOU conducts its classes on Saturdays and Sundays. Computer laboratories are used as online test centers by outside organizations on holidays. The College auditorium is offered on hire to outsiders for educational and cultural programmes.

The key responsibility areas of the IQAC in the context of governance and management:

Documentation of various reports sent to the respective Governing Agencies on time.

Documentation and approval of faculty record.

Maintenance of records pertaining to different programmes held in the College.

Organizing quality improvement programmes for faculty members.

The Principal ensures that members of the faculty are given autonomous decision-making powers with regard to their academic and administrative functions.

Decision making structure: The Principal supervises the decision making structure of the college through the hierarchy of academic administration. The Vice Principals, Deans, Member Secretary – Academic Council, Coordinator – IQAC, Heads of Departments and members of the Faculty actively participate in the decision making procedures of the institution.

Support staff: Members of the support staff are included as members of different committees in order to participate in the governance and administration of the College.

Being a Jesuit Institution, St. Xavier's College has its own Chapel. Students, irrespective of their belief visit this for a moment of prayer and peace. Every Xaverian has experienced the presence of Providence in this campus. The College governance and leadership ensures formation of men and women for others who would be agents of social change.

St. Xavier's College as a higher educational institution is highly concerned about and proactive in its response to the changes that are taking place at the local, national and the global scenario.

The quality of the basic courses is improved after every three years when a thorough revision of the syllabus is undertaken by the BOS on the basis of the experience gained from the previous three years.

The Curriculum Restructuring Committee is tasked with preparing a modern format of the curriculum with emphasis on research orientation, inter disciplinary studies and employability.

Innovations also include designing of innovative experiments, inter-disciplinary study and employability.

The College has introduced five certificate courses and two diploma courses under Career Oriented Programmes for value addition.

The career opportunities of the students are enhanced through internship, projects, participation in national and international seminars, development of leadership qualities through social activities, soft skill training, EDC activities and Career Oriented Programmes.

The institution ensures the quality of its administration through decentralization and participation of all stakeholders in major policy decisions. The administration is transparent with clear delegation of duties and responsibilities. Fellowship gathering of staff, students and administration promote an ambience of oneness. This ensures quality management in all academic and administrative aspects.

Inclusive practices of the institution to impart holistic education are inherent in the system. The institution is completely secular in character. Students belong to every social class, community and linguistic group. They are trained to become men and women of competence, commitment, compassion and conscience. Equity and access in availability, special attention to the weaker sections and representation of women in all aspects ensure promotion of social justice.

Compulsory credit for social work and outreach activities, assistance to disaster victims, adoption of villages for rehabilitation work and educational assistance, blood donationcamp, Shishu Mela etc. inculcate value based social responsibility and conscientious citizenship amongst the student community.

Active involvement of alumni/ae is ensured through various programmes like monthly open forum and, national/international conventions.

The main problems are: (1) Space Crunch (2) Recruitment. With the increase in the number of departments, staff and students, the Park street campus is proving to be especially insufficient for the introduction of more and newer courses. The College has acquired more space to open new campuses. Delay in sanctioning substantive posts by the government following retirement of the faculty and non-availability of suitable teachers in certain departments for Management posts are creating problems for filling up the vacant posts.

1.1.2 Describe the mechanism used in the design and development of the curriculum. Give details on the process. (Need Assessment, Feedback, etc.)

The curriculum for the courses are developed keeping in mind the industry requirements and the feedback from the stakeholders.

Initially the proposed curriculum is developed by the faculties of the individual departments by taking into consideration

- ♣ The stated objectives of the courses.
- The latest developments in the industry related to the courses and the expectation from a student graduating the course.
- → The formal and informal feedback from the stakeholders related to curriculum from previous year, if available. The Principal also takes feedback from the students through students' parliament, a suggestion box installed at the Principal's office.
- ♣ Specific usage of ICT and advanced techniques are also discussed.

The draft curriculum is reviewed by Principal and the Board of Studies members for final approval. The Board of Studies consists of members of senior faculties, external experts, industry experts and the student representatives. The proposed changes are subsequently incorporated and implementation schedule is finalized.

Curriculum is developed in consultation with industry experts such as Integrated Marketing Communication, Human Resource Management, Mass Communication and Public Relations, Logistics and Supply Chain Management, Foreign Trade Practices and Management, NSE certified Capital Market Professional Course and Tax Practices and Procedures.

1.1.3 How does the College involve industry, research bodies, and civil society in the curriculum design and development process? How did the College benefit through the involvement of the stakeholders?

The statute of the University mandates that the Board of Study should consist of external experts and subject experts from reputed institutes. The curriculum designed by the college is reviewed and finalized by the Board of Studies.

The faculties and the students also interact with the industry during live projects, attending seminars and providing inputs on the latest industry requirements.

The college also invites faculties of national repute for guest lecture and takes feedback on a number of aspects related to curriculum.

1.1.4 How are the following aspects ensured through curriculum design and development? * Employability * Innovation * Research.

Employability of the students has always been a key focus area for the curriculum design. Accordingly, supplementary certificate courses are also offered to the students. To promote the research culture among the students, faculties are encouraged to include research projects as a part of the curriculum.

Innovation has always been one of the key focus areas of our colleges. We have introduced innovative practices such as student seminars, live projects, using ICT



technologies for teaching learning. From the academic year 2015, we have planned to introduce online MCQ's accessible through mobile and computer with random question set for each student.

1.1.5 How does College ensure that the curriculum developed addresses the needs of the society and have relevance to the regional / national developmental needs?

- ♣ The Board of Studies includes external members and industry experts to ensure the courses are in tune with the regional and national developmental needs.
- ♣ The course content is displayed in the college website and prospectus and a feedback link is provided in the college website. The feedback is automatically analyzed and the recommendations are reviewed by the Board of Studies members periodically.
- ♣ Teachers also participate in syllabus-oriented workshops, orientation and refresher courses organized by various Universities and other Institutions and receive training, provided by the college, on effective usage of latest ICT techniques for effective dissemination of curriculum.

1.1.6 To what extent does the College use the guidelines of the regulatory bodies for developing or restructuring the curricula? Has the College been instrumental in leading any curricular reform which has created a national impact?

The College consults UGC model syllabi and the syllabi of University of Calcuttawhile developing the curriculum. In addition, the syllabi from a number of reputed foreign universities are also consulted while developing the curriculum.

As such there is no direct national impact. However, the students of St. Xavier's College, Kolkata, are recruited by national and international corporates, which is a testimony for the industry relevance of the courses.

Currently some members of our faculties function in the capacity of invited experts as members of Board of Studies of other institutions.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

1.2.1. Give details on the following provisions with reference to academic flexibility.

a. Core / Ancillary options: The College offers Honours in Arts, Science, Commerce, and Business Administration. The B. A. and B. Sc Honours students study one major subject, two ancillary subjects and two compulsory subjects. The Core courses in Humanities are English, Political Science, Sociology and Bengali. These subjects are also offered as ancillary subjects with different combinations, for example – a student with Honours in English can take Political Science and Sociology as the combination subjects. In the Humanities department a degree in BA General is also offered to students with ancillary subjects such as English, Political Science, Sociology and Communicative English along with compulsory language subjects.



The core courses in Science are Mathematics, Physics, Economics, Chemistry, Statistics, Microbiology, Biotechnology, Computer Science, Mass Communication and Videography, Bachelor of Multimedia with specialization in Animation. These subjects are also offered as ancillary subjects with different combinations, for example – a student with Honours in Mathematics can take Physics and Computer Science as his/her ancillary subjects. Physics, Computer Science, Microbiology, Biotechnology and Multimedia with Animation are offered as Post Graduate programmes of study. Biotechnology and Multimedia with Animation (with exit option after three years) offers an integrated course of five years for the students.

The core courses in Commerce are Accounting and Finance, Marketing Management and E-Commerce. These subjects are also offered for ancillary combinations. Commerce also offers a Post Graduate Programme.

The core courses in Business Administration are Financial Management and Marketing Management. These subjects are also offered for ancillary combinations.

The new campus at Raghabpur, the rural face of St. Xavier's College, offers Honours in Bengali and Commerce and BA General Degree with the same ancillary and compulsory combinations as the main campus.

The College offers B. Ed course which is approved by NCTE.

- **b.** Enrichment courses The Foundation courses comprise:
 - 1. Inter–Religious Studies and Social Harmony (FC1) and 2. Personality Development (FC2). Faculty members of different departments guide students in the final semester for competitive examination, entrance to Masters Programmes for Higher Studies.
- **c.** Courses offered in modular form All programmes of study involve a modular form of curriculum design.
- **d.** Credit transfer and accumulation facility The Credit Transfer arrangement is available to Foreign students in the International exchange Programmes. The Accumulation facility has not yet been incorporated in evaluative framework.

The College has also formulated a credit transfer policy keeping parity with the European and US credit system.

The curriculum is developed in tune with the Vision and Mission of the institution and the Jesuit Society to promote quality education. To assess the outcome of the stated objectives of curriculum, the college conducts unit tests, selection tests and collects informal assessments/observations from the students from time to time.

The Controller of Examination with the Principal, Vice Principals and Member Secretary, Academic Council conduct regular assessment of student performance in every semester with the aid of statistical analysis.

Papers in Part Iand Part II under University of Calcutta or any UGC approved university in India, and have appeared in Part III in 2014 (result pending) may also apply; the admission, however, shall be provisional, subject to the fulfillment of minimum eligibility criteria.

Students having arrear in any paper in B.Com / BBA need not apply. Students doing accounting Honoursmay apply for master of marketing management; but students doing marketing Honourscannot apply for M.Com. with accounting and finance specialization.

M.Sc. Computer Science - ADMISSION (2014-2015) ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

- ♣ B.Sc. in Computer Science or its equivalent like BIT/ BCA having passed Mathematics (Business Mathematics not eligible) in 10+2 level. (Those students who have completed their 2nd year University Examination in 2013 and awaiting 3rd year Examination Results are also eligible.)
- Correspondence/ Distance education courses are not eligible.
- Admission is provisional and it will be finalized subject to passing the B. Sc or equivalent with a minimum of 60%.
- → The principal criterion adopted for admission is merit. However, as a minority institution, the college offers a lower cutoff to the Christian students. Again,



- special considerations are granted to the students with outstanding achievements in sports at national and international level.
- ♣ Physically challenged students. The final list of selected students is prepared after departmental counselling (in some departments) and displayed in the college website as well as college notice boards.

Does the College have a mechanism to review its admission process and student profiles annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an analysis and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

An admission committee is formed consisting of the Principal, Vice Principals, and members of representative communities. At the end of the admission process, the process of admission itself is reviewed and inputs are taken for the betterment of the admission process. Regular review of the admission policy is also conducted in the Academic Council meetings. In addition, students' profiles are also analyzed by using an admission software and the summary is scrutinized by the Principal and management.

2.1.4 What are the strategies adopted to increase / improve access to students belonging to the following categories?

* SC/ST/OBC

There is a 25% reservation for SC, ST, OBC A and OBC B categories. Financial assistances are provided to the students as applicable.

* Women

Except for B. Com Morning, which is for Boys, St. Xavier's college has girl students for all other courses. The girls feel comfortable in the academic environment of the college. A women's cell is set up in the college that conducts workshops to sensitize students about gender issues. A mechanism is in place to promptly address any issues related to sexual harassment. No such issues, however, was reported to the college management.

* Different categories of persons with disabilities

In general, the campus is friendly for disabled. Elevators are in place to enable access to higher floors. The office is in the ground floor for easy access. Initiatives such as XRCVC, started by St. Xavier's College, Mumbai, may also be incorporated in St. Xavier's College, Kolkata in future.





2.2.2 Does the College have a mechanism through which the "differential requirements of student population" are analyzed after admission and before the commencement of classes? If so, how are the key issues identified and addressed?

- ♣ The college has a structured mentoring programme where the different needs of the students are analyzed by the mentors through informal interaction with the students.
- ♣ The faculties, in the course of taking regular classes for the students, identifies special requirements of the students.
- ♣ The class representatives of every class also communicates specific needs, if any. In case a specific need is identified, appropriate actions are taken to address it immediately. For example, the students who are not so proficient in English, are directed to enroll in the language lab.

The mentors and the faculties provide additional support to the students beyond the regular class hours as necessary.

2.2.3 Does the College provide bridge /Remedial /add - on courses? If yes, how are they structured into the time table? Give details of the courses offered, department-wise/faculty-wise?

Bridge Courses are being offered in some programmes of studies in the main campus and the Raghabpur Campus.


Profile mapping of the students is conducted through

- a. detailed and elaborate admission process;
- b. interview of each student with the respective vice principals.

Again, orientation of the newly admitted candidates is conducted within the first month of admission.

However, if a student is found deficient, or is a slow learner, immediate measures through remedial and tutorial classes are introduced to ensure that the student is raised to the required bar.

In addition, once the students who would require special assistance are identified, tutorial classes and remedial courses are organized for such students to enable them to cope up with the programmes of study they have chosen.



2.2.4 Has the College conducted a study on the incremental academic growth of different categories of students; - student from disadvantaged sections of society, economically disadvantaged, physically challenged and slow learners etc.? If yes, give details on how the study has helped the College to improve the performance of these students.

The Controller's office reviews the results data with the help of a software after result is declared for every examination. In the process, academic progression for different groups of students is reviewed with the Principal and the suggestions are noted to improve the performance of the disadvantaged sections of the society.

The respective faculties are also appraised of the findings and the recommended actions. The faculties, in turn, provide extra support to the students outside the classes to improve their academic performance.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to the learning needs of advanced learners?

The faculties monitor the way students respond in class. Based on this observation the advanced learners are identified.

The students are provided with additionalguidance after the classes whenever necessary. The faculties also provide these students with study material. Specialized facilities such as JStor, Inflibnet are available to the meritorious students in the library for academic use.

At the departmental level, mini research projects are arranged by some departments for advanced learners to promote research orientation among the students.

The students are encouraged to participate in intra-college and inter-college projects. They are members in active research conducted in collaboration with the faculty.

2.2.6 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

Govt. policies for differently-abled students are followed. In addition, a number of facilities are offered to the differently-abled students

- ♣ Diverse facilities such as the ramps at various entry points of the college building.
- Access to lift usage.
- ♣ The library is manned by adequate number of assistants to help the students according to their individual needs.
- ♣ PWD washrooms and drinking water facilities are made available to the students.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan and evaluation blue print, etc.)

- ♣ The college has a process where in the academic plan for the year is prepared at the beginning of the session.
- ♣ The Academic Council meeting is held at the beginning of every session before the commencement of the course in order to prepare the academic plan for the semester. Each semester has about 15 weeks including teaching and examination days. The faculties are also asked to give their part of input for the preparation of this calendar. Based on the input, an academic plan is prepared.
- ≠ This academic calendar once prepared is circulated to all the departments.
- ♣ The HODs of the departments assign the courses to each of the faculties and the faculties are asked to submit a detailed session plan for the subjects.
- ♣ Based on the academic calendar, the time table is created. The time table is available in the college website and in the student portal.
- ♣ Each session plan submitted is thoroughly checked by the HODs of each department and the same is also communicated to the IQAC coordinator.
- ♣ The college also organizes a meeting for monitoring the process of curriculum delivery at the midsession called the midterm review meeting to check for anydeviation from the allotted session plan. Corrective actions, such as organizing extra classes are taken if necessary.
- ♣ The examination notice is put up in the college notice board and exams are conducted as per schedule. Central evaluation is organized for each examination.
- ♣ Students are shown the corrected answer scripts after exam and the model answers are discussed with the students.
- ♣ The students have the option of applying for re-evaluation if necessary.
- From the year 2015 online examination is introduced for continuous internal assessment for all subjects. Under this process question bank is created for all the subjects. When the student's login a random set of questionnaire is created for each student. The assessment result is available for the faculties.
- ♣ An e-campus programmehas beenintroduced by the College in collaboration with Epaathsala. In this programme the students may submit their assignments and they may access additional learning materials uploaded by the faculties through the online portal.

2.3.2 Does the College provide course outlines and course schedules prior to the commencement of the academic session? If yes, how is the effectiveness of the process ensured?

The course content and the structure is made available to the students in the college website and the prospectus. The students may check the details online.

If there is a pre requisite for any course, the same is communicated to the students in advance before the commencement of the course.



A question bank is also made available to the students for practice examinations. Questions papers of previous years are also available in the college website for download.

2.3.3 What are the courses, which predominantly follow the lecture method? Apart from classroom interactions, what are the other methods of learning experiences provided to students?

In general, all the courses follow a lecture method. However, other than lecture a number of other methods are followed by individual faculties such as

- **♣** Self-learning through presentations
- **★** Case studies and group discussions
- Project works
- **♣** Industrial visits
- ♣ Live projects and internships
- 4 All online content used by the faculties for the purpose of teaching learning is made available through an e-campus programme. Through this programme the students may login to the e-campus through the College website and access all the content.

2.3.4 How is 'learning' made more student-centric? Give a list of participatory learning activities adopted by the faculty that contribute to holistic development and improved student learning, besides facilitating life-long learning and knowledge management.

- ♣ Participatory learning is one of the key areas of focus in St. Xavier's College, Kolkata.
- Faculties are encouraged to make use of student-centric methods in teaching learning like group discussions, quiz on subject topics etc. Students are encouraged to participate in seminars and make individual class presentations using powerpoint method.
- ♣ Term papers and dissertations are a part of the curriculum for a number of subjects where the students work in a group and submit the project report to the concerned faculties.
- ♣ In line with the education philosophy of the Jesuit Institutions, blended learning is practiced in some departments where the conventional lectures are supplemented with online course content and online group discussions. The college uses epaathsala software for this purpose.
- 4 As a part of e-campus programme an online forum is made available. Through this programme students can post their queries on various topics. These queries may be answered by the faculties or by the fellow students.
- ♣ In addition to the online forum the e-campus also contains options for discussion on the learning materials uploaded by the faculties.



2.3.5 What is the College policy on inviting experts / people of eminence to provide lectures / seminars for students?

In order to promote a quality learning environment, the college invites eminent faculties and industry experts at departmental level and college level to address the students on academic issues as well as issues of social relevance. Feedback is taken from the experts on college curriculum and the quality of interaction.

In the past 4 years, the following faculties and experts visited our campus.

- » April 1, 2015: Dr. Bibash Chakraborti, Formerly of NPL, New Delhi, delivered a talk entitled "Surface characterization using Electron and beam spectroscopy.

- » July 18, 2014: Prof. Joydeep Dutta, Chair in Nanotechnology, Sultan Qaboos University delivered a talk entitled "Nanotechnology and water desalination".
- » August 8, 2014: Science Academics Lecture Workshop on 'Physics of Electronic Materials'. The seminarwas sponsored by the Indian Academy of Sciences, Indian National Science Academy, The National Academy of Sciences of India. Prof. Arup Roy Chaudhuri, Prof. S. K. Roy, Prof. Indrani Bose, and Prof. D. N. Bose gave talks at the workshops.
- » 1st November, 2014: Prof. Manabendra Mandal (Chairman and National coordinator of Action against Trafficking and Sexual Exploitation of Children, India and Visiting faculty of University of Calcutta) participated as a key speaker.
- » 7th March, 2014: Prof. Sukanta Bose of the Physics Department of Washington State University and Head of LIGO India, delivered a talk on "Seeing and hearing gravitational wave sources".
- » 24th March, 2014: the 2nd Father Vestraeten Memorial Lecture was delivered by Prof. T. V. Ramakrishna, Emeritus Professor of Physics, Benaras Hindu University.
- » 8th July, 2013: An International Seminar "The Unknowable and the counterintuitive" was organized jointly by Physics and EVS departments. The speakers were Dr. Aleksandar Zecevic, Professor of electrical Engineering of Santa Clara University, USA,
- » Swami Atmapriyananda, Vice Chancellor, R K Mission Vivekananda University, Belur Howrah and Rev. Dr. Xavier Savairamuthu, Head, Department of Environmental Studies at SXC, Kolkata.
- » 19th and 20th July, 2013: A lecture workshop by the Science Academics was organized. The speakers were Prof. Amitava Raychaudhuri, J. C. Bose fellow in the Physics Department of Calcutta University, Dr. Ananda Dasgupta of IISER, Kolkata, Prof. Anirban Bhattacharyya, of the Institute of Radio physics and Electronics, Calcutta University, Prof. Bikash Chakraborty of SINP, Kolkata.
- » 11th September, 2013: Renowned scholar Professor Shobhanlal Dutta Gupta delivered alecture entitled 'The Political Philosophy of Hegel' to students and teachers.



2.3.6 What are the latest technologies and facilities used by the faculty for effective teaching? Ex: Virtual laboratories, e-learning, open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

- ♣ The IQAC promotes usage of latest ICT techniques to deliver quality education to the students. At the department level, faculties are encouraged by the head of the departments to use ICT.
- ♣ This method has proved to be more interesting to the students than the regular teaching with blackboard and chalk.
- The Educational Multimedia Research Center of the college prepares lecture videos on various subjects and transmits it at the national and international levels. The NSS unit of the college regularly conducts "College to Village and Village to College "educational programmes.
- ♣ The lectures used by the faculties in the class are uploaded to the e-campus. Students may login to epaathsala e-campus and download the material for further studies.
- Four computer laboratories have been set up with upgraded software and internet connection for the usage of the students. In addition, students may access internet from the cyber room laboratory.
- ♣ The college is planning to introduce online MCQ from the academic year 2015-16, in which students may appear for some of the internal exams using their mobile device. In addition, each student will also get a unique set of questions, without any additional configuration from the faculties.
- ♣ As a part of e-campus programme an online forum is made available. Through this
- programme student can post their queries on various topics. These queries may be
- **a** answered by the faculties or by the fellow students.
- ♣ In addition to the online forum the e-campus also contains options for discussion on the learning material uploaded by the faculties.

2.3.7 Is there a provision for the services of counselors / mentors/ advisors for each class or group of students for academic, personal and psycho-socio guidance? If yes, give details of the process and the number of students who have benefitted.

- ♣ The college has a counseling center with one counselor for providing academic, personal and psycho-socio guidance.
- 4 A career counseling cell is in place in the placement cell that guides students on multiple career options.
- The college has a structured mentoring programme where each student has got access to a mentor for academic and nonacademic support.
- 4 A student profile mapping exercise is conducted post admission for every student. The profile mapping results are made available to the counselors and the mentors to provide support as necessary.
- ♣ After every examination, the Controller of Examination conducts a review using a software and accordingly, additional academic help is offered by the faculties to the deserving students.



- → The college fosters a congenial environment where students often share their academic and emotional stress with the teachers, where remedial measures pertinent to individual cases are suggested.
- ♣ Faculty members of different departments are available to students outside the stipulated class hours. Academically weak students are helped out in terms of remedial classes.
- ♣ The College also has an online platform using which the students can reach out to their mentors and seek academic, personal and psycho-social support. The students can login with their unique login ID's and get in touch with their respective mentors.

2.3.8 Are there any innovative teaching approaches/methods/ practices adopted/put to use by the faculty during the last four years? If yes, did they improve the learning? What methods were used to evaluate the impact of such practices? What are the efforts made by the institution in giving the faculty due recognition for innovation in teaching?

The college asks the faculties to keep themselves updated about the latest trends in the growing technology and also the developments in the field they teach or their respective subject.

They are often encouraged to attend seminars/conferences/workshops and share their knowledge with the fellow faculties. The faculties are also asked to make use of latest teaching methods like using power point presentations for delivering lectures etc. The college has updated computer labs that can be used by faculties to improve their teaching efficiency.

All members of the faculty have access to internet facilities offered by the college. Teachers employ alternative methods of teaching such as powerpoint presentations graphs and charts, syllabus-related film screenings in order to enhance the quality of the teaching-learning process.

Minor research projects are included in some departmental curriculum that promotes research orientation among the students.

Feedback is taken from the students using an online software linked to the college website and analyzed automatically by the software. The results are reviewed by the IQAC coordinator and the Academic Council and suggestions are noted for implementation in the next academic year.

2.3.9 How does the College create a culture of instilling and nurturing creativity and scientific temper among the learners?

The faculties usually encourage the students to take part in seminars and student conferences to help them improve their self-confidence and presentation skills. The college also conducts extracurricular activities that the students are asked to participate in.

These practices are believed to transform the students into lifelong learners and innovators.

Every department has a Departmental Journal. In addition, there is a Journal dedicated to scientific growth and research. 'Aviskaar', the research journal of the College, is launched every year on the Valedictory day.

Minor research projects are included as a part of the curriculum where the students are required to submit research proposal, research hypothesis and a research report to make them familiar with research activities and promote research orientation among the students.

Dissertation in the sixth semester is mandatory for all students belonging to different programmes of study. The students do the dissertation under the critical supervision of Professors in respective subjects.

2.3.11 What efforts are made to facilitate the faculty in learning / handling computer-aided teaching/ learning materials? What are the facilities available in the College for such efforts?

The college encouragesthe faculties to keep themselves updated about the latest trends in technology and also the developments in the field they teach or their respective subjects.

They are often encouraged to attend seminars/conferences/workshops and share their knowledge with the fellow faculties. The faculties are also asked to make use of latestteaching methods like using power point presentations for delivering lectures etc. The college has updated computer labs that can be used by faculties to improve their teaching efficiency.

All members of the faculty have access to internet facilities offered by the college. Teachers employ alternative methods of teaching such as powerpoint presentations graphs and charts, syllabus-related film screenings in order to enhance the quality of the teaching learning process.

The classrooms are equipped with latest ICT facilities. Internet facility is protected by a firewall. The college has two fully equipped seminar rooms.

Laptops and portable projectors are available for ICT enabled teaching.

2.3.12 Does the College have a mechanism for evaluation of teachers by the students / alumni? If yes, how is the evaluation used in achieving qualitative improvement in the teaching-learning process?

The college had a process to take feedback from the students. The reports are analyzed and suggestions are discussed with the respective faculties by the Principal.



From the academic year 2015-16, 360⁰ feedback process is initiated in the college. In this process, feedback is taken from students, self-feedback by faculties, feedback by management and feedback by peers. The feedback links are placed in the college website. The feedback is analyzed by software and feedback report is created in which the competency score of each faculty is also created.

2.3.13 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If yes elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

As such, the institution does not face any challenges in completing the curriculum on time. However, amid term review process is in place where the Head of the Department reviews the progress along with session plan submitted by each faculty. In case any discrepancy is noted, extra classes are arranged.

2.3.14 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- The College has a well-equipped library with a good collection of books for use by both faculties and students. The new arrivals in the library are put up as a list in the library notice board.
- ♣ If there is a shortage of any book, then the college sees to it that the problem is sorted out. The students are encouraged to make use of the library as much as possible.
- The college has installed JStor and other academic software to facilitate students research. Each department submits a list of syllabus-related text and reference books through the heads of the respective departments to be ordered in the library for students' use.
- To cater to the requirements of the students, a number of CD, DVD and other electronic materials are also made available in the library.

2.3.15 How does the institution continuously monitor, evaluate and report on the quality of teaching, teaching methods used, classroom environments and the effect on student performance.

The college believes that continuous monitoring and evaluation is an essential step towards implementing quality environment for teaching learning. The college monitors quality in a number of ways:

- Faculty quality and quality of teaching learning is monitored through a process of 360° degree.
- Feedback link is available in the college website for providing feedback on institution quality.
- **♣** Suggestion box provided at the Principal's office.
- Feedback is collected through the formal and informal interaction of the Principal with the students and the faculties.
- Result of the students is analyzed by the Controller of Examination after every examination using a software.



- Feedback is taken from the Students' Council.
- Class representatives provide feedback.
- Faculties and staff are also welcome to share their ideas and feedback.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 What is the faculty strength of the College? How many positions are filled against the sanctioned strength? How many of them are from outside the state?

There are 236 Faculty members in the college for the year 2014-15. There are 65 sanctioned seats, which are already filled up. There are 171 additional College created posts, all of which are filled up. All the teachers are from within the state.

2.4.2 How are the members of the faculty selected?

Usually, the Government and the University monitors appointments against the sanctioned posts in the college.

For filling up the vacant posts, after consulting the University, the draft advertisement is submitted to the University for Approval. Subsequently the advertisement is published in the college website and all India newspapers.

Applicants are informed by email and post about the interview date.

For the purpose of conducting interview, a selection board is formed as per university norms. In case there is a delay in getting the salary from the Government. After the faculties are appointed, an advance is extended towards the salary of the appointed faculties.



2.4.6 Does the College have the required number of qualified and competent teachers to handle all the courses for all departments? If not, how do you cope with the requirements? How many faculty members were appointed during the last four years?

The management, in consultation with the IQAC, reviews the faculty strength of each department periodically to ensure quality education is imparted to the students. In case the sanctioned faculty strength is less than the minimum number of faculties required, the college appoints temporary or permanent faculties whose salaries are paid from the college fund.

In certain situations, the college may still appoint temporary or permanent faculties of repute to ensure quality education for the students.

The college has a mechanism in place to formulate and review strategies on recruitment and retention of quality teaching resources, such as recruit and retain teachers by two subject experts deputed by the particular Universityand one VC nominee. They are continued in the coming sessions and where required the faculty on contractual basis is offered permanent employment. In some cases, additional increment is also paid to a candidate with good skills and qualification.

2.4.7 How many visiting Professors are on the rolls of the College?

There are 29 Visiting Professors on the rolls of the College.

2.4.8 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (eg: providing research grants, study leave, nomination to national/international conferences/Seminars, in-service training, organizing national/international conferences etc.)

- ♣ Faculty members are encouraged to pursue research through PhD and postdoctoral programmes of study.
- ♣ The higher research committee motivates Faculties to take up minor and major research projects. As required, additional leave is also arranged by the research committee for the faculties pursuing research as necessary.
- **♣** The college organizes FDP/FIP for the faculties.
- ♣ Workshops are regularly organized to introduce the faculties to latest teaching learning technique.
- ♣ Faculty members are also involved in post-graduate teaching in different universities. Many teachers act as resource persons in seminars organized by other institutions.
- Some teachers are invited as external experts in conducting interviews and evaluation of Public Service Examinations.
- Teachers are encouraged to participate in national and international level seminars and workshops.
- → Faculty members publish subject related specialized papers in national and international journals. Books of research are also published by teachers of different faculties.
- ♣ The college organizes national and international seminars.



- ♣ Additional academic exposure is sponsored by the college at national and international universities.
- ♣ Course on Science and Religion was offeredby Dr. Alexander Zecevic from Santa Clara University (USA). Additional credit was given to students who attended this course.



The college recognizes the importance of innovation to provide quality education. Accordingly, a system is in place to reward the faculties for innovation in the form of acknowledgement and sharing the idea with other faculties in the college and outside the campus.

In the recent past, a number of innovative practices were introduced by the college

- **♣** Introduction of student seminar in some departments.
- **♣** Introduction of lectures by eminent faculties in some departments.
- Use of ICT in teaching learning.
- ♣ Proposed introduction of online MCQ from the academic year 2015-16.
- As a part of e-campus programme an online forum is made available. Through this programme student can post their queries on various topics. These queries may be answered by the faculties or by the fellow students.
- In addition to the online forum the e-campus also contains options for discussion on the learning material uploaded by the faculties.

- A number of faculties of the college are invited as guest faculties in institutions across India and abroad. The faculties are also invited as resource persons in seminars and workshops. The information is available with the IQAC office of the college.
- ♣ A formal faculty exchange programme is in place with the following institutions.
- The faculty exchange programme provides the faculties with an opportunity to get trained in the latest trends in teaching learning as practiced in the leading institutions across the world. The faculties, in turn, provide valuable input in design of curriculum and teaching learning strategies to ensure quality education for our students.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the College ensure that all the stakeholders are aware of the evaluation processes that are operative?

- The college structures the academic calendar at the beginning of the session. This calendar contains all the information about the tests, internal assessments and exams that are to be conducted for that session.
- ♣ The college also helps the students to score better in the exams by showing them their answer scripts of the tests and internal assessments. This practice helps the students to understand where they stand in academics and ways to improve.



- → The college also conducts meetings with parents to tell them how their wards are performing in the academics and other activities.
- An elaborate system of evaluation is in place where students are evaluated in a semester through various individual methods of assessment. The continuous internal assessment pattern involves mid semester examinations, class tests, term papers and dissertations through which the students' academic progress is meticulously monitored.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms initiated by the College and to what extent have they been implemented in the College? Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the evaluation management system?

The college plans to introduce online MCQ from the next academic session for continuous internal assessment. Under this system, random set of questions are automatically generated for each student appearing for the exam and the results are automatically calculated.

From the inception of autonomy, we have been introducing changes in the teaching, learning and evaluation practices to bring these in alignment with the mission and vision of our institution.

To achieve a greater degree of transparency, accountability and fairness in the aspects of the preparation of examination question papers (QP's) and assessment, a number of changes have been introduced from July 2013. The Principle, "One who teaches should also assess", has been adopted along with appropriate checks and balances. These control become operational at appropriate stages through the agency of peer review by externals and internals.

- ♣ Preparation of the Question paper:
 - ❖ Course instructor sets QP's in accordance with the specific guidelines developed for the purpose. Parallel a second set is prepared by the external paper setters.

An external moderator prepares, from the two sets of a QP, one single paper in accordance with a set of specific guidelines. The course instructor who is also the internal paper setter is present during moderation to provide assistance and /or inputs if requested by the external moderator. The latter checks to ensure that the QP

- **❖** Is valid
- Covers the declared syllabus
- Has stretch and
- ❖ Is accessible to students of all categories of ability.

To this effect the moderator is required to submit a confidential report.

Assessment of the answer scripts:

- ❖ A detailed Marking Scheme (MS) is developed in examiners' (external and internal) meeting. This is done to ensure that marking is reliable and consistent.
- ❖ The course instructor marks the script in accordance with MS marking being done anonymously. "Blind" marking is practiced.



❖ Appropriate samples of the marked scripts (generally 30% of total from each packets) are evaluated independently by external using the agreed upon MS.

If the marks difference in a significant number of scripts (50% of a sample 20% scripts which are evaluated by the external examiner) varies by 15% then the internal examiner and the HOD separately are required to account for it. This inspection and scrutiny may be followed by 100% re-evaluation. This exercise provides an opportunity for self-learning by the internals.

Finally, after the publication of the result a candidate may apply for "seeing" and /or "review". This "review" is done by another internal/external examiner.

2.5.3 What measures have been taken by the institution for continuous evaluation of students and ensuring their progress and improved performance?

St. Xavier's College Kolkata is an autonomous institution which has its own independent method of assessment and evaluation.

The college has an elaborate internal assessment system- C.I.A., mid-term tests, class tests and term papers where the student's performance is consistently monitored. The Controllers of Examinations office maintains and processes the evaluation data and prepares statistical charts on the basis of the analysis of the end semester results. The data is handed out to individual departments for discussion and critical assessment.

The college plans to introduce online MCQ from the next academic session for continuous internal assessment. Under this system, random set of questions are automatically generated for each student appearing for the exam and the results are automatically calculated.

Students are monitored through the following: -

- ♣ Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) in different forms through weekly tests, midterms tests, assignments, seminars and projects. For continuous assessment we follow formative assessment which includes unit tests, group discussions, internal assessment etc.
- Regular monitoring of class attendance which is updated and posted periodically on the website.
- **♣** End semester examinations.
- Regular monitoring of performances (Curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities) by the faculty members and HoD's.
- Monitoring by Vice Principals, Deans and HoD's and meeting the parents when needed for their appraisal.
- **♣** Counselling session for students.
- Remedial classes for weaker/arrear students.

2.5.4 What percentage of marks is earmarked for continuous internal assessment? Indicate the mechanisms strategized to ensure rigor of the internal assessment process?

In general, 40% of the total marks is earmarked for continuous internal assessment.



The college recognizes the importance of every student being evaluated by his or her strength, and not the weakness. Accordingly, each faculty is provided with complete flexibility to design the internal assessment.

In some departments, apart from the conventional test, activities such as field visits, presentations etc. are also part of continuous internal assessment.

20% of marks is earmarked for CIA.

The offices of the Vice Principals maintain a meticulous track of each and every student and ensure that the student takes the CIA tests. Failure to qualify the CIA leads to the students being "Debarred" from taking the end sem examination.

2.5.5 Does the College adhere to the declared examination schedules? If not, what measures have been taken to address the delay?

- **♣** The college strictly adheres to the declared examination schedule.
- → The College has so far adhered to declare examination schedule. In case of unforeseen situation like 'Strike' a rescheduled date is announced, keeping in consideration the convenience of the students.

2.5.6 What is the average time taken by the College for declaration of examination results? Indicate the mode / media adopted by the College for the publication of examination results e.g., website, SMS, email, etc.

Evaluation of the sample scripts by the external examiners, for Semester VI, within 10 calendar days from the day of dispatch of the scripts. For other Semester, 15 such days.

Publication of the results for Semester VI, within 30 to 35 calendar days counting from the date of the last theory exam. For other semesters, 40 to 45 such days. The results are published on the College website and notice boards.

2.5.7 Does the college have an integrated examination platform for the following processes?

- *Pre-examination processes Time table generation, OMR, student list generation, invigilators, squads, attendance sheet, online payment gateway, etc.
- * Examination process Examination material management, logistics.
- * Post examination process attendance capture, OMR based exam result, auto processing, generic result processing and certification.

There is no software for integrated examination platform. However, a separate examination unit is in place headed by the Controller of Examination.

The examination schedule is announced during the commencement of the session and is published in the academic calendar. The time table is also published well in advance. The invigilator squad is determined by the examination office.

The college has subscribed to Bill Desk payment gateway. The students may pay examination fees through the payment gateway.

A committee of faculty members is involved for conducting the examination, including making photocopies and monitoring the examination process. At the end of



the exam, the answer scripts are handed over to the examination office for safe custody.

A moderation process is in place post evaluation for some examinations. Subsequently, the Principal meets with every department heads to review the results. Students are provided with the mark sheet and an opportunity is provided to the students to review their answer script.

The integrated examination platform is the office of the respective Vice Principal's. All the processes are in place. OMR is yet to be introduced.

2.5.8 Has the College introduced any reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process?

The College does not have a mechanism for PHD evaluation process.

2.5.9 What efforts are made by the College to streamline the operations at the Office of the Controller of Examinations? Mention any significant efforts which have improved process and functioning of the examination division/section?

The office of the Controller of Examination is assisted by a committee of senior faculty members who monitors the entire examination process. Feedback is taken formally and informally and any deficiency in the process is addressed in the next examination.

Introduction of Online MCQ is proposed from the next academic year to improve the quality of continuous internal assessment and make it more scalable.

From the inception of autonomy, we have been introducing changes in the teaching, learning and evaluation practices to bring these in alignment with the mission and vision of our institution.

To achieve a greater degree of transparency, accountability and fairness in the aspects of the preparation of examination question papers (QP's) and assessment, a number of changes have been introduced from July 2013. The Principle, "One who teaches should also assess", has been adopted along with appropriate checks and balances. These control become operational at appropriate stages through the agency of peer review by externals and internals.

Preparation of the Question paper:

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An external moderator prepares, from the two sets of a QP, one single paper in accordance with a set of specific guidelines. The course instructor who is also the internal paper setter is present during moderation to provide assistance and /or inputs if requested by the external moderator. The latter checks to ensure that the QP

- Is valid

2.5.10 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation?

The students are provided with an opportunity to check the corrected answer scripts.

In case the students are not happy with the evaluation, they may apply for reevaluation. The answer scripts are rechecked by internal or external faculties.

For any other grievances, students are encouraging to meet with the Principal or Vice Principal.

Finally, after the publication of the result a candidate may apply for "seeing" and /or "review". This "review" is done by another internal/external examiner.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the College have clearly stated learning outcomes for its programmes? If yes, give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

During the preparation of syllabi, the Board of Studies members, reviews the learning objectives and expected learning outcome for each course. Accordingly, the teaching learning strategies are finalized and communicated to the concerned faculties.

The College calendar cum prospectus is published at the beginning of the academic year having information related to the vision and mission, history, courses, rules, regulations, departments, faculty lists, holidays, important dates and the co-curricular and extracurricular activities. The information is disseminated to students through:

- ♣ College calendar which is distributed to all students at the beginning of academic year.
- **♣** Information through website, which is regularly updated.
- **♣** Use of notice board for daily information.
- **♣** Distribution of printed syllabus for semester course content.



♣ College magazine, newsletter and departmental magazines which are distributed to the students.

2.6.2 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The achievement of learning outcome is measured through

- Continuous internal assessment
- **♣** Day to day interaction with the students
- Final examination at the end of semester
- ♣ The individual departments ensure that quality contact hours outside the class are offered by individual professors in meeting students to clarify their academic queries and other matters.

After every exam, the Controller of Examination analyzes the results using a software. The monitoring of the achievement of the learning outcomes is conducted by CIA, submission of assignments based on classroom seminars, projects, class test, term papers, mid sem examination and attendance. The College also conducts formative and summative assessment for students. The students are monitored so that the learning outcomes of the College is achieved.

The achievement of learning outcome is ensuring through regular meetings of the students and when necessary the parents, with the HoD's, Deans, Vice Principals of the different department.

2.6.3 How does the institution collect and analyse data on student learning outcomes and use it for overcoming barriers of learning?


- ♣ After the examination, the Controller of Examination analyzes the data using a software. In case the results are not normalized, it indicates a discrepancy in the examination or the evaluation system.
- ♣ In case a discrepancy is identified, suggestions are noted and implemented in the next examination.
- ♣ Collection: Board results CIA examinations and semester examination results analysis and overcoming barriers: Students who fail in 50% or more of all papers at the end of the first two semesters are called by the HoD's Dean' Vice Principal's for Academic Counseling. In some cases, they are advised to repeat the year for improvement; if they choose to continue, they are counseled as to how and when to appear for arrear papers after taking remedial classes from the departmental teachers.

- The statistics and microbiology departments have collaborated in data processing and paper publishing in peer reviewed journals and also in presenting their national and international seminars.
- The chemistry and microbiology departments have collaborated in testing antimicrobial properties of synthetic complexes.
- The instruments obtained through research grant of one faculty member and being used by other faculty member and many of these have been placed in the central research facility.
- EDC organizes interdisciplinary training programmes for students from College and outside the College.

Between College and Institutes:







 - ♣ Rallies were conducted to promote awareness for protecting environment.
 - * "Forming Men and Women for others" is one of the mission statements of the College. Therefore, this dimension or ISR existed from the time the College was



established. However, in recent years it has been clearly spelt out and further strengthened.

- → By Appointing a full time trained personnel to Plan, Implement, Monitor and Evaluate all the outreach programmes.
- ♣ All students of the College have to complete 30 hours of social work as part of their non-academic credit requirement.

The main focus of the College has been rural development. Initially, students would visit a particular village, organize a work camp for about 10 days and help build a road, clean a pond or construct houses that used to be destroyed by natural calamities. In January 2006, project PRAYAS (College to Village, Village to College) was launched. Two villages were adopted for overall development. Currently there are 10 villages covered under PRAYAS.

(For the Pedagogy of PRAYAS please see the PRAYAS booklet.)

Some of the other outreach programmes organized by the College through the social work department:

- » Annual Blood Donation Camp
- » Annual work camp in villages (College to Village)
- » Shishu Mela for underprivileged children
- » Annual Prayas camp (Village to College)
- » Awareness programmes on social issues
- » Opinion polls and surveys within and outside the campus
- » Green Clean Neighbourhood campaign
- » Sunday village visits for education
- » Sunday service to orphanages, old age homes etc.
- » Adoption of villages affected by Natural Calamities.

Students' campus experience gets enriched when they become part of the whole process of the outreach programmes. They get an opportunity to see the reality of our State and our Country. This helps them value the privileges they have and also develop a sense of concern and responsibility towards the have nots.

3.6.2 How does the College promote College-neighborhood network and student engagement, contributing to holistic development of students and sustained community development?

- → The College promotes collaborations with likeminded institutions, NGOs and organizations.
- ♣ Mother Teresa's Missionaries of Charity Homes (2), Indian Institute of Cerebral Palsy, Asha Niketan, St. Joseph's Old Age Home, Snegam and Seva Kendra Kolkata are some such Institutions and NGOs that network with College.
- ♣ Students are sent to these places on a regular basis for service learning.
- ♣ Records of these visits are documented.



- Regular evaluations are held with the partner organizations and students to monitor progress of both.
- ♣ The College also networks with the Kolkata Police and the Kolkata Municipal Corporation for some of its outreach programmes like Green Clean Neighborhood campaign etc.

The college believes that holistic learning is a key focus area to be successful. Accordingly, faculties and students are encouraged to participate in extracurricular and co-curricular activities, and extension programmes through NSS and AICUF, to engage with community.

As mentioned earlier, all students have to put in 180 hours of work through cocurricular activities of which 30 hours are compulsory from social service.

Faculty members head the various Societies for co-curricular activities. Therefore, they become part of all the activities of the Societies. Many offer voluntary service as well.

Students are awarded with credits, certificates etc. which help them in their future endeavors.

Students are encouraged to represent College for various programmes and activities within and outside the city provided they fulfill the required criteria as laid down by College rules.

New models of teaching as learnt from other institutions have impacted the visibility of the College.

Through improvement in the teaching-learning methods and the dynamic nature of teaching as learnt from other institutions, the College has tremendously benefited academically.

Teaching gets analyzed in several ways for understanding. Designing of novel teaching methods takes place and teaching materials are identified with a view to realizing specific objectives, making teaching more effective. This modification is based on feedbacks.

Education has become a tri-polar process involving the educator, educate and the social-milieu. Collaborations have become the good means for good ends enabling clear thinking with no prejudice. In this way the teaching learning process has become more effective, democratic and friendly.

Financially, there is no gain as the focus is on sharing education. Student programmes are organized and exchange takes place between institutions on a no cost basis (As per MOU). Faculty exchange also does not incur any financial gain.

3.7.4 Have the College industry interactions resulted in the establishment / creation of highly specialized laboratories / facilities?

- ♣ Information regarding Research, Consultancy and Extension: Major Grants are running in the Department of Physics, Chemistry and Biotechnology. The Department of Microbiology has been involved in the following consultancies:
- ♣ Acted as coordinators in organizing Environment Awareness Programme to management and staff of HSBC, carried out by M/S Ennovate Global, New Delhi.
- ♣ Completed the microbial fermentation using Madhuka Indica, to M/S Chemico Process Pvt. Ltd.
- → Preparation of e content of UGC Microbiology syllabus in collaboration with EMMRC, St. Xavier's College.
- ♣ Perspective Plan for Research and Development: The College now has a self-contained Central Research facility of about 4500 sq. ft area. The infrastructure includes:
- ♣ A cold room maintained at 4⁰C
- ♣ Animal and Plant tissue culture labs
- ♣ General biology and Chemistry labs
- **♣** Instrumentation and Sciences Education Laboratories
- Server Room
- → The facility houses instruments funded by DST (Department of Science and Technology, Government of India) FIST programme and CE grant. These instruments are meant to promote Research and Teaching (both in UG and PG courses) in the Physics, Chemistry, Microbiology and Biotechnology Departments.

Some of the instruments HITACHI U2900, HITACHI F700 and AAS are already in use by the undergraduate and postgraduate students of the Departments of Chemistry



(Semester IV, V) and Microbiology respectively.

The facility also houses instruments from personal grants of the Faculty members of **Biotechnology and Chemistry Departments.**

- ♣ <u>Plant Tissue Culture Room:</u> Work has started in this room using the laminar air flow cabinet and the inoculated explants will be generated and grown in Petridishes or jam bottles placed under white light in tissue culture rack.
- ♣ General Biology laboratory: Presently, homogenization of plants specimens in mortar pestle for DNA or RNA isolation and biochemical assays is being done. Gel electrophoresis for checking the nucleic acid or protein samples is also followed. In future, protein shall be transferred to membranes for Western Blot analysis.
- Animal Tissue Culture Room: The specialized laboratory houses a CO₂ incubator in which various murine and human cancer cell (obtained from National Centre for Cell Science, Pune) are kept for culturing and fro performing various experiments related to cancer biology including study of matrix metalloproteinase, cell surface receptors and cellular signaling pathways and effects of anti-tumorigenic compounds. The set-up of the room and the antechamber ensures the cells are kept in as sterile a condition as possible. However, the room currently lacks a laminar flow hood/ biosafety cabinet for maintenance and passaging of cell lines. With the acquisition of further equipment including a laminar flow hood/ biosafety cabinet and an inverted microscope (which may be obtained from subsequent projects/ grants) the room will be fully equipped as an independent Animal Tissue Culture laboratory in which researchers can perform experiments for studying animal cells and tissue, cell cycles, various aspects related to cancer biology etc.
- Cold Room: The Cold Room allows separation of specific proteins / enzymes from a cell / tissue homogenate or from culture media by means of immune operation using specific antibodies or by affinity binding to specific components. The low temperature ensure that the proteins/ enzymes are not degraded and do not lose their biological activity.

Any additional information regarding Research, Consultancy and Extension, which the institution would like to include.

The measures adopted are –

Research and consultancy

- Setting up of St. Xavier's College Centre for Research and Training and formation of Research and Consultancy Cell in B. Com and B.B.A. departments.
- An Ethical Committee has been formed to investigate and confirm that the research does not violate ethical norms.
- Teachers are recognized and rewarded for their doctoral and research work. Rs.
 5000 is awarded as a token of appreciation for completing PhD.
- As per UGC norms they are granted study leave for completing their PhD and post-doctoral programmes.
- They are granted leave on duty for presenting papers.



- The College pays the registration fee and part of the travel costs for the same.
- Teachers/departments are encouraged to conduct seminars, conferences and workshops.
- Central Research Facility has been set up for the science departments.
- Teachers are encouraged to undertake major and minor research projects from UGC/CSIR/DST and publish papers in research journals.
- Seed money is provided to projects which have been sanctioned by funding authorities as adjustable advance to initiate the research project.
- Making adjustments in faculty timetables to enable them to pursue research.
- Every year, students of Microbiology Department submit and present papers at the Indian Science Congress.
- Students participate in All India Students' Conference for CA courses.
- Projects/term-papers, which are a part of the curriculum, involve research by students.
- Students publish research papers.
- Contemporary ICT facilities including Inflibnet and Delnet.
- Subscription to research journals including e-journals.
- Research cubicles for faculty with internet access.
- Well stocked Central Library.
- Well-equipped laboratories.
- Publication of the annual research magazine of the College "Aviskar" which includes peer reviewed research articles by both faculty and students.
- Constant encouragement from the management to involve in and take up research activities.

Extension activities

- Appointment of a full time Director for NSS and Social Work.
- Provision for adequate infrastructure and facilities.
- Provide opportunity to the students to participate in various extension activities coordinated by NSS, NCC, AICUF, XCS and various other societies.
- Students get non-academic credits by participating in these activities for 180 hours in their three years of stay.
- Students are awarded certificates as a mark of recognition for their services.
- Orientation programmes are conducted by NSS, AICUF, LTS and other societies for freshers on the extension activities and initiatives of the College.
- Students are taken to the adopted villages (including villages that have been adopted after natural calamities) for orientation and motivation in social service
- Formation of EDC.
- Setting up of Women's Cell SWAR, to promote awareness on women's rights
- Women's cell in AICUF and Alumni/ae association.



CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 **Physical Facilities**

What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

With the increase in strength, as per requirement, the institution approaches UGC for approval of additional funds. Additional funds at times are also obtained from other sources such as alumni or private funding. The management actively offers helps as and when any infrastructural change is required. Creation and enhancement of infrastructural facilities for improving the teaching-learning process, and extending maximum possible educational amenities to its growing strength of learners is the primary objective of the Institution.

To optimize utilization of the existing resources, some of the resources are shared across departments. For example, the college has four upgraded computer labs which are shared between departments for optimal utilization.

The College plans ensure and optimize utilizations in the following ways: -

- **♣** Conference Hall with Videoconferencing facility.
- Fiber Optics.
- **♣** Smart Classrooms.
- ♣ The institution has set up a standard process for creation and enhancement of infrastructure for teaching and learning.
- ♣ The goal of the College in terms of education depends on the infrastructure
- ♣ The College has had its infrastructural facilities upgraded with LCD projectors
- ♣ A seminar cum conference room has also been setup in the College to facilitate and host seminars and other conferences without many difficulties.

To optimize utilization of the existing resources, some of the resources are shared across departments. For example, the College has four upgraded computer labs which are shared between departments for optimal utilization.

Creation and enhancement of infrastructural facilities for improving the teachinglearning process, and extending maximum possible educational amenities to its growing strength of learners is the primary objective of the Institution.

4.1.2 Does the College have a policy for creation and enhancement of infrastructure in order to promote a good teaching-learning environment? If yes, mention a few recent initiatives.

The Principal, the Vice Principals, the ICT Resource Management Committee (ICTRMC) (The names of the members are published in the College calendar and prospectus), meet the different departments at regular intervals to create, enhance and review infrastructural requirements that will further and optimize the quality of teaching learning environment. The issues are also taken up in the Governing Body Meetings, the Academic Council Meeting and The Core Committee Meetings.



The IQAC meets the faculties in order to collect feedback on the adequacy of existing infrastructure and gathers relevant information regarding additional infrastructure requirements. The recommendations are forwarded to the management.

The Principal and the management also meet the faculties and review additional infrastructure requirements from time to time.

For example, based on the requirements, in the recent past, few classrooms are upgraded to AV enabled classroom.

The recent Initiatives: -

- ♣ The Rural Campus at Raghabpur.
- ♣ Provision of a Central Library facility.
- ♣ Expansion in the present campus by adding more floor space and opening of the Jubilee building wherein a part has been used for relocating the support staff quarters and the rest for class rooms and office rooms.
- ♣ Opening of the centralized computer lab, AC staff room, MCV studio and a Central Research Facility.
- **↓** Upgradation of Class Room with Audio Visual Facilities.
- **Upgradation** of laboratories.
- Upgrading the infrastructure by constructing lifts, ramps, power generators and addition of more class rooms.
- **♣** Construction of AV rooms and Conference room for departmental seminars.
- ♣ Providing all offices with computers and with internet connections.
- ♣ Maintenance of the Observatory along with facility of using Solar Energy.

For the ICT activities the developments are:

- **Let Campus** networking through optical fiber.
- **♣** Centralization of computer labs.
- ♣ Providing ICT facilities to all departments and offices.
- **▲** Leased line broadband, INFLIBNET, DELENT, E-journals and E-books.
- ♣ Having EPBX exchange of its own with 400 internal connections, STD, fax, and other facilities.

4.1.3 Does the College provide all departments with facilities like office room, common room, separate rest rooms for women students and staff?

The College provides separate office rooms for different departments, Common Rooms and separate rest rooms for women students and staff.

4.1.4 How does the College ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students/staff with disabilities?

The college has a policy to make new infrastructure differently-abled friendly as much as applicable: -

- ♣ Infrastructure facilities such as ramp, lift, wheel chairs etc.
- ♣ An Infirmary to address medical needs.
- ♣ Providing writers in separate room during examination.
- ♣ Giving additional time during examination. Offices that require the students to

correspond on daily / regular basis are located on the ground floor.

4.1.5 How does the College cater to the residential requirements of students? Mention

- ♣ Capacity of the hostels and occupancy (to be given separately for men and women):
 - The Fr. Lemming Boys' Hostel was inaugurated in July 2014 with a capacity of 285 students.
 - The Girls' hostel named as Mother Teresa Girls' Hostel has become functional from July 2015 with a capacity of 185 students.
- ♣ Recreational facilities in hostel/s like gymnasium, yoga center, etc.: -
 - The Hostel has a games room, an entertainment room, and a gymnasium.
- ♣ Broadband connectivity / Wi-Fi facility in hostel/s.: -
 - Broadband Connectivity / Wi-Fifacility are available.

4.1.6 How does the College cope with the health related support services for its students, faculty and non-teaching staff on the campus and beyond?

The institution has a well-equipped infirmary, which acts as a health center, under a Jesuit Brother as the infirmaries, a compounder, and trained nurses and ayas. 

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

5.1.1 Does the College have an independent system for student support and mentoring? If yes, what are its structural and functional characteristics?

The College has an independent and integrated system for student support and mentoring. As the students are from various cultures, religions, languages, race, nationality and ethnicity, a cosmopolitan atmosphere prevails on the campus. The college administration takes care to maintain a positive ambience of brotherhood and understanding.

Under this system, after the commencement of session, each student is assigned to a faculty as a mentee. The details of the mentor are shared with the student. The student may contact the mentor for any kind of academic, psychological or any other support that they require.

From the academic year 2014-15, the College has subscribed to epaathsala mentoring solution. Under this, a student may contact the mentor through online portal and post his or her queries. The mentor may login to the system and address the concerns of the students. The documentation is also maintained by the software.

The Mentoring scheme is managed by the Dean of Science and Dean of International Studies. Notices are published for students who might feel the need for tutoring and remedial classes.

The Dean of Science assigns Professors to the students along with the tutorial timings. The professor records the attendance of the students and needs them on a regular weekly basis. Records of such tutorials are maintain by the Dean of International Studies who submits data, countersigned by the Vice Principal to the Principal's office. Also based on semester results the Deans of different department in consultation with the Vice Principals may counsel students who have not fared well in semester exam to approach the respective professor for tutorial or remedial classes.

The individual teachers and the HOD of the department identify the slow and advanced learners on the basis of classroom interactions, internal assessments and counseling.

For the former, remedial and tutorial classes are held.

There are separate SC, ST and Minority Cells to look into the specific problems and needs of slow learners belonging to these groups.

For the latter they are encouraged to attend summer courses in research institutes and are helped for competitive examinations.

Advanced students are encouraged to present papers and attend national seminars / workshops.

The college has also started coaching for entry to services using an online platform. Using this student can take mock online tests and prepare for such competitive exams.

EDC challenges the advanced learners to go in for entrepreneurship and imparts training to them.

There is a professor functioning as a Mentor for every class in B.Com.



Students interact with faculty outside the classroom to discuss various academic matters. Small groups of students are assigned to a mentor and regular meetings help in identifying students who require academic support.

Class mentors also guide students while choosing their ancillary subjects. Faculties arrange remedial classes for slow learners. Teachers encourage self-learning of the students through group discussions and peer learning.

Technology is used to reach out to diverse learners in remedial coaching/academic mentoring. From the academic year 2014-15, the college has subscribed to epaathsala mentoring solution. Under this, a student may contact the mentor through online portal and post his or her queries. The mentor may login to the system and address the concerns of the students. The documentation is also maintained by the software.

Close check is kept on students' attendance which is the sole indicator of the students' commitment. List of students with insufficient attendance (below 75%) are published on a monthly basis. They are required to meet the Vice Principals and Deans who use the occasion to find out about the student's problem, both academic and personal. Part of the mentoring also involves assigning the students to department heads, professors for academic tutoring / nonacademic tutoring.

Faculty Members meet students outside the assigned class hours to address their individual problems – personal, extra-academic and issues related to career planning. The College Has Counselling Cell which offers counseling services to all students, through an expert counselor. Teachers try to keep themselves updated about the students with regard to their overall well-being so that they can offer their assistance whenever required.

Simulated online exam modules in line with various competitive exams are available.

The college has a full time placement officer. The number of students placed both for jobs and higher studies programme, conducted by multi-national companies has increased considerably over period of years.

A number of certificate courses offered promote the employability of the students. Entry-to-services coaching is provided to the students to help them prepare for the competitive examinations.

From the academic year 2014-15, the college has subscribed to epaathsala simulation platform where the students may appear for online mock tests in line with various competitive exams to help them prepare better for competitive examinations.

- ♣ Annual Spiritual retreats and a weekly two semester moral course for Christian students.







The office also maintains a close liaison with the Foreigner's Regional Registration Office in maintaining their entry and exit data with regard to the College.

♣ Physically challenged / Differently-abled students

The campus is made friendly for the physically challenged students. Access is provided to the elevator. Additional staff are available in the library to assist such students. Ramp is constructed as necessary.

In addition to the above, for differently-abled students the following are available:

- Infrastructure facilities such as ramp, lift, wheel chairs etc.
- Providing writers in separate room during examination.
- Giving extra time during examination.

SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

For SC/ST and OBC A and OBC B students, reservation is provided for every course as per Government norms. In addition, a number of scholarships are available for the economically weaker sections.

- > students to participate in various competitions/ conferences in India and abroad



The students of St. Xavier's College, Kolkata regularly participates in various competitions and conferences organized by other institutions. A number of awards are won by our students in various competitions organized by other institutions.

Faculty Members encourage and train students to participate in Seminar, Workshops and Conferences at National and International Levels. Certain departments in Science arranges for student's participation in The Annual Science Congress programmes. Students' paper are also published in various Journals.

Health center, health insurance etc.

On call doctors are available in the campus to address students' health - related issues. Ambulance service is available for any emergencies.

First aid is provided by NSS, a well-equipped infirmary with support staff. A Jesuit Brother is the in charge of the infirmary which has a comprehensive list of doctors from specialization areas. Most of the doctors are our own alumni/ae. There is also free medical clinic within the campus. Group health insurance scheme for the students has not yet been introduced. There are regular health checkups organized in the hostel.

- ➤ EDC offers Skill Set Training in Science and Technology sponsored by DST in collaboration with industry, Entrepreneurship Development Programme sponsored by DST and Entrepreneurship Awareness Programme sponsored by EDI.
- ➤ Compulsory one credit co-curricular programme in social and community service through the department of Social Work to promote community orientation.
- ➤ Ten day programme in villages offered by NSS and AICUF twice a year (May-June and September-October) for training and community orientation.
- ➤ Disaster Management, Road Safety Awareness and Health Awareness programmes organized by the department of social work.
- ➤ Leadership Training programmes offered by NSS, AICUF and LTS to develop skills.
- ➤ Annual Spiritual retreats and a weekly two semester moral course for Christian students.

Besides, competence enhancement classes, classes for students who fail in end semester exams or those who express the need for additional coaching; remedial classes are conducted in the evenings or during the week ends. This also has helped in improving the pass percentage.

- Regular classes are conducted in the evenings and on weekends for students to prepare them for civil services and other competitive exams.
- ♣ Different departments of the college offer guidance to final year students to enable them to prepare for competitive exams, entrance tests at the post graduate level and other tests.
- ♣ The College provides academic guidance to students appearing for the Civil Service examinations through its IAS Guidance Cell. Along with regular Faculty Members, IAS and IPS officers of different batches come to provide their valuable guidance to the Civil Services aspirants.

The college has a glorious tradition of excellence in sports, games and athletics. The college has developed a support mechanism to guide students who want to take up a career in sports.

In case the students participate in external sports events, additional leaves are arranged for them as necessary on a case to case basis for some students.

* special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials

Students who represent the college in any sports or games event are provided with uniform, necessary sports material and allowance for travel and food.



* any other

The institution has a large number of cultural societies and associations which organize activities throughout the year to facilitate a rich curricular culture in the college. The sports department organizes different kinds of sports and games, inter and intra college competitions at the state and national levels involving a large cross section of the student community from different departments.

The students' union and the student societies organize various student cultural activities. In brief the activities of the various societies are as follows:

- ♣ Students Union (SU): It organizes "XAVOTSAV" three day annual inter College festival. This annual event turns out to be the cynosure of the city.
- ▲ Xaverian Academy of Dance and Music (XADAM): -XADAM is a performing arts body training students in classical and contemporary vocal music and dance. The cultural programme for the inaugural day and welcome function for freshers is conducted by XADAM. XADAM also trains students to perform for the Convocation and Valedictory function, the annual sports and Independence Day ceremony. Rabindra Jayanti (25th Baishak) and Rabindra Pryan Dibas (22nd Sravana) is celebrated with choreographed versions of poems, songs and dances of Tagore. XADAM presented a30 minute performance of classical Indian dances and vocals on Teachers Day to pay their respects to their teachers.
- The English Academy (EA): The English Academy has been instrumental in nurturing and developing the creative talents of students through such cultural events as Literature Quiz Contest, inter College poetry and creative writing competitions, seminars and film screenings. The annual event of the Academy is English Literaria, a day-long inter College competition including writing competition, extempore, and literary debate. As part of the 150 years' celebration, the Academy held a two day Shakespeare Film Festival where cinematic adaptation and rare prints of silent Shakespeare films were screened. This was followed by an inter-College student seminar. The students of the academy represent the department in several university debates and quiz competitions to win laurels for the College.
- Bengali Literary Society (BLS): Established in the year 1930. A book named "Parampara" was published on this occasion. BLS annually celebrates the Bhasa Dibas (21st February) and Rabindra Tirodhan Dibas in which seminars and cultural functions are held. It has recently launched its Bengali literary magazine "Tirpurni".
- Hindi Literary Society (HLS): The society organizes events related to the National language through intra departmental debates and essay writing competition. The HLS organizes an annual inter College festival, "Vividha" hosting events in debate, extempore, recitation, instrumental music, solo vocal, classical and folk dance and drama. The society has recently launched a literary magazine, "Bahurang".
- Fine Arts Society (FAS): This society concerns itself primarily with organizing and hosting events in western contemporary and classical music, painting and photography. The most ambitious project of the society has been the founding of



- the St. Xavier's College Choir directed by Prof. B. Da Silva and Prof. C. Mirza. Over the last five years the society has organized three St. Xavier's College choir concerts, an annual art photography competition, and annual western classical and contemporary music concerts.
- ♣ Xaverian Debating Society (XDS): The XDS trains the student in the twin disciplines of debating and quizzing. The society students have participated in various debating and quizzing contests and have performed extremely well.
- ▲ Xaverian Theatrical Society (XTS): XTS is a vibrant and colorful society which has truly revolutionized the art of performing multi lingual plays by incorporating songs, dances and on-stage costume changes. It participates regularly in theatre festivals and performs street plays.
- Women's Cell (SWAR): The cell is about understanding our everyday experiences more critically through lectures, counselling, research, seminar, workshops and film shows. Its annual activity is the celebration of International Women's Day through seminars and discussions emphasizing on the idea of the "New Women" who is independent, confident and successful. Very recently in collaboration with NSS and IWART (International Association of Women in Radio and Television) SWAR has started its Gender Sensitization Seminar cum workshop.
- ★ Xavier's Commerce Society (XCS): The objective of the society is to develop and promote business skills in our students. It annually arranges (a) INSIGNIA, a national level annual inter-College management fest in which Colleges from other states participate. (b) YOU THINK, the annual journal of the commerce department. (c) INNOVISION/ INTELLIGENTSIA, the annual seminar where professionals from renowned institutions share their wisdom with the students and answer questions raised by the students.
- * Xavier's Mangement Society (XMS): Xaviers Mangement Society belives in inspiring students to dream and learn more by nurshring leaders in the process. The society provides students with a platform to explore their management prowess. Xavier's Management Convention is one of the most awaited events of the society featuring top Colleges from all across the country to participate in a plethora of events related to management. X-talk is a panel discussion organized by the society wherein eminent personalities from various fields share their views on different topics. The annual magazine, "The X-ecutive" features articles from students faculty members and various seasoned professionals along with interviews with leading businessmen and industrialist.
- ★ Xavier's Sociological Society (XSC): XSC publishes its annual journal "Young Scoiologist" including contributions of students and faculty members, which is followed by an external experts lecture.
- ▲ Xavier's Economics Society (XES): The XES organizes the annual National Economics summit "Confluence" which involves the participation of emminet instituions from across the country along with lectures delivered by emminet academicians. The society publishes its Economics Journal "Eco Echoes" involving



- students and teachers of te department. Deligation from the society are sent to various economics summit accorss the country each year.
- ▲ Xaver's Statistical Society (XSS): XSC organies its annual national seminar involving academicians from emminet instituions. It encourages students to participate in different events over the year. The society also publishes its annual magazine "Prakarsho" representing the collaborative efforts of the teachers and students of the department.
- ★ Xaverian Film Academy (XFA): XFA actively hosts workshops, interactive sessions, films screenings for its much anticipated annual fest "Cinematheque" which has grown into one of the most awaited student film festivals in Kolkata. The festival has been host to a wide array of competive categories including short fiction film making, documentary film making, music vidoes, advertisement films, photography contest, film reviews etc.
- Science Association: The St. Xavier's College Science Association has always aimed to promote scientific interest and awareness in all students of the instituion. It involves a number of events such as Quest, an intra college quiz and debate completion, science exhibition. The society also publishes its annual magazine "Pebbles" containg articles scientific papers by students and teachers of the department.
- ➡ National Service Scheme (NSS): The Department of Social Work and NSS (National Service Scheme) reaches out to under-privileged and marginalized sections of our society. The motto "Not me but you" upholds the need for a selfless society. The College has adopted the following villages as part of the College to Village, Village to College programme Nurshidarchowk, Debipur, Shalpukur, Paikhala, Balarampur, Hogulkuria (New Village), Bholakhali, Gurap, Pandua, Jhantipahari

The College conducts: -

- ♣ Green Clean Neighborhood throughout the year.
- **♣** I-Camp organized in the villages like Raghabpur.
- ♣ Sunday Literacy and Education project in the villages of Debipur, Shalpukur, Balarampur, Paikhala and Nurashidarchowk.
- Women's Day celebration addressing issues like Domestic Violence, Child Marriage, Education of Girl Children and General Safety.
- ♣ Art workshop for the rural children for career oriented empowerment
- ♣ Street plays based on social issues.
- ♣ Shishu Mela.
- ₩ Winter Camp organized in Shalpukur for constructing Brick laden roads.
- ➡ The "Prayas Camp" is held annually to promote the "Village to College" theme involving 60 rural students of standard 11 and 12.
- ♣ All India Catholic University Federation (AICUF): The AICUF is an All India Movement with a membership of 30,000 students in 300 units in 12 states. It arranges the annual state level leadership camps during summer and puja vacations,



the annual AICUF day celebration, social service activities, study sessions, seminars and retreats. Six villages in Malda have been adopted where village children are helped for their study. The motto of AICUF is: "We are born in an unjust society and we are determined not to allow it to be as we have found it.

- National Cadet Corps (NCC): The NCC conducts parades in the College grounds and Fort William on important occasions. It participates in the Independece Day celebration in the College grounds whre NCC cadets of the College offer the Chief Guest the ceremonial guard of honour and Rashtriya slaute to the National Flag. Ex-cadets of the College are selected in various military academies, various cadets also represent the state in national integration camps and cultural competitions.
- Leadership Training Service (LTS): LTS develops the conepts of collective leadership and situational leadership. LTS members actively collaborates in organizing several events connected with enviornemtal concern, social service and winter carnival.

Sports: - the Sports department of the College encourages the students to participate in various events such as Tennis, Basjketball, Badminton, Football and various other intercollege and intra College events. The College boasts of University Blues in chess, Table tennis, Squash, Hockey, Basketball, Rowing, Badminton, Lawn Tennis, Shooting and Snookers. Sports department organizes its annual sports day programme involving studenst and teachers in various events.

From the year 2015, the college has subscribed to an online placement portal through epaathsala, where additional placement support is provided to the students. The process of registration to job posting is also being automated using the same platform.



Every year our placement cell arranges seminar, soft skill development training, and internship Programme/training with the help of our corporate partners. Students get an opportunity to learn about how to choose a right path for their career, writing of a CV, interview technics, participating in GD etc. Moreover, we have our alumni members who come forward and render a helping hand through counseling and career guidance to all individuals. Also placement cell core committee members and student volunteers always be there to help them in their career path. Through placement cell every year we do invite new companies to come for campus drive in different fields, so that every student can take part in the campus drive.

5.1.13 Does the College have a registered Alumni association? If yes, what are its activities and contributions to the development of the College?

The college has a registered Alumni Association.

St Xavier's college boasts of an illustrious alumni association comprising of eminent personalities in both academics and industry. The alumni group is active in many ways: It organises meetings on a regular basis to mobilise funds for college welfare, social welfare activities, cultural activities. There are national and international chapters in places like Goa, USA, Europe and Australia. The alumnus directory is updated regularly for information related to their activities.

The College has a very strong Alumni/ae Association with around 4000 members. The Principal of the College is the ex-officio President of the association. The activities are as follows:

- ♣ Increase networking by means of setting up alumni/ae chapters in other Indian cities as well as countries abroad.
- Organizing the annual cultural show, "Beyond Barriers" to raise funds.
- Organizing "Beyond Boundaries", an international convention.
- Organizing the Fr. Joris Memorial debate.
- ♣ The celebration of the Teachers' Day to pay their respects to their teachers.



- 4 Assisting and taking up various social projects such as- running a school in "Paikhala" village in South 24 Parganas.
- ♣ In collaboration with the College NSS the alumni/ae association has adopted 'Bholakhali', an Aila affected village.
- ♣ In 1985, when the College celebrated its 125 years, the association built up a substantial scholarship fund. The association continues to raise funds for College's development activities but also for scholarships. In the 1stInternational Convention held in Bangkok in July 2010, the association raised Rs. 10 lakhs towards scholarships, particularly for 1st generation learners.
- The association usually meet every Friday for fellowship and an open forum is held on the 1st Friday of every month where the Principal is present along with the honorary secretary and other governing council members.
- **★** The Governing Council meets once in three months.
- ♣ The association has a dedicated office within the campus on the ground floor with a fulltime office attendant.
- Besides philanthropic activities the association extends its assistance to members of the association, and staff and students of the Colleges under exigencies.
- ♣ The association helps in forming and consolidating alumni associations in other institutions.
- ♣ SXCCAA is one of the many Jesuit alumni associations in India affiliated to Jesuit Alumni Association of India (JAAI). It is also a part of the International Federation World Union of Jesuit Alumni (WUJA).

5.1.14 Does the College have a student grievance redressal cell? Give details of the nature of grievances reported and how they were redressed.

- ♣ The college has a Students' Grievance Redressal Cell. The cell meets whenever necessary and takes prompt action to resolve the complaints that are brought to its notice. Each complaint is suitably addressed at the earliest.
- ♣ An online link is provided in the college website through which the students may submit their grievances. The grievances submitted in the online portal is carefully reviewed and addressed by the cell.
- ♣ After the grievance is addressed to the satisfaction of the student, the grievance is disposed of by the Principal.
- The Vice Principal and the Dean of Students Council are available to address the grievances of the students in their free time. The students can bring their problems to them directly or through their student representatives who are members of the Student Council. All kinds of problems faced by them, in the teaching or administrative areas are addressed speedily
- ♣ There is a Grievance Redressal Cell (GRC). The cell is vested with the authority to arbitrate any type of grievances raised by the students of the College. The committee members of GRC examine the complaint and recommend the case, if necessary, to the Principal. The Principal is the final authority to take action.



Late Association of St. Xavier's has had a great tradition of transparency and freedom. Students are always encouraged to express their difficulties, problems and grievances directly to the authorities and the faculty and these would be promptly looked into. The Jesuit maxim 'Give us a boy and we shall return a man and a citizen of the country' has always influenced the thinking and interaction within the institution.

5.1.15 Does the College have a cell and mechanism to resolve issues of sexual harassment?

- ♣ SWAR (Women cell of the College) organizes lectures and interactive sessions for the students where they are motivated and empowered to handle any kind of harassment they face in the world outside.
- ♣ The college has a committee against sexual harassment which takes up various cases of sexual harassment if any.
- → There is a committee against Sexual Harassment to look into such matters. Prior to the formation of the committee, SWAR the women's cell of the College looked into such cases. The discipline and the atmosphere of the College are such that there prevails gender equality and harmony within the campus. There has been only one case of sexual harassment till date.

5.1.16 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

- ♣ The college does have an anti-ragging committee consisting of Professors and headed by the Principal as the chairperson of this committee as mentioned in the college prospectus which deals with various cases of redressal and remedies.
- ♣ No major instances of ragging have been reported so far.
- → The Vice Principal and Deans of the respective offices strictly monitor the students especially during the admission period. However, ragging cases have not been identified so far in the College.

5.1.17 How does the College elicit the cooperation from all stakeholders to ensure overall development of the students considering the curricular and co - curricular activities, research, community orientation, etc.?

- ♣ Parent teacher meetingsare held periodically. Feedback is obtained from the parents at an informal level during these meetings.
- Feedback link is provided in the college website where all stakeholders may provide feedback on various institutional provisions. The data is analysed and the reports are automatically created by a software. The IQAC reviews the reports and the suggestions are communicated to the management.

The sports department organizes different kinds of sports and games, inter and intra college competitions at the state and national levels involving a large cross section of the student community from different departments. Each Society organizes inter department events as well as an annual event involving participants from the college and other Colleges from the city and the state.

A considerable number of female participants are encouraged to represent the College in a variety of events at the State and National level championships. 

St. Xavier's College is owned and managed by the Jesuits of the Calcutta Province of the Society of Jesus. With the registration of Catholic Mission of West Bengal (also known as Calcutta Province of the Society of Jesus) under the Societies Registration Act 1961, the ownership of St. Xavier's College was vested with this said Society from its registration in 1973, and it was administered by a Governing Body constituted as per statutes of Calcutta University. In May 2005, the Founder Body initiated the registration of a new Society, in the name of St. Xavier's College Kolkata Educational Trust. The administration and management of St. Xavier's College is now brought under this Trust with effect from 1st June 2006, and the day-to-day administration is vested with the Governing Body, as per guidelines of the UGC for Autonomous Colleges with minority character.

The broad policies and overall direction is framed by the management. However, the executive leadership consists of the Principal, the Vice Principals and assisted by a number of committees. The participatory role of the management encourages and sustains the involvement of the college staff, which is necessary for the efficient and effective running of the College.

The Principal is a member of a number of national and international committees and forums, and is invited a number of times to visit universities in US and other countries. The IQAC always promotes the use of technology for providing quality education to the students. A number of faculties use PowerPoint and other ICT techniques. The basic infrastructure is also being upgraded continuously to support use of technology in teaching learning. There are four computer labs with upgraded hardware and internet connectivity for the use of teachers and students. Online journals are available in the library.

The College is offering a course in History Honours. in its rural campus from 2015.

Committees have been formed to frame syllabi for Master in Social Work, MBA and extension of Chemistry and Mathematics into post graduate programmes.

Regarding examination reforms: The committee recommended that the College conducts supplementary examinations for students of 5^{th} Semester when sixth semester examination are held. The College has introduced supplementary examination for both 5^{th} and 6^{th} semester students so that may avoid loss of academic year.

The committee recommended that the Substantive post of 1 Professor, 2 Associate Professors and 3 Assistant Professors for each Postgraduate Department may be provided.

We have forwarded this proposal to the Higher Education Department of the Government. College also has its own plan of doing it once it becomes a University.

The Jesuit educational network is the largest in the world today. They have always been pioneers in the forefront of education. The first Jesuit College was established in Goa in 1546. Today there are 53 Colleges and 300 Higher Secondary Schools in India. Jesuits have always had a perspective plan. St. Xavier's College with its 156 years of history has a perspective plan today we can define this plan starting from the year 2006, which includes –

- Plan to get autonomy
- Plan to be become Centre with Potential for Excellence
- College of Excellence (April 2014)
- St. Xavier's University, Kolkata (expected by 2017)
- SXC has been recognized as a Heritage College by the UGC (May 2015)

Our perspective plan is called SXC Vision 2020, which includes academic expansion and infrastructural expansion. We began with expansion in the main campus itself. In 2006 we had around 6000 students. Today we have around 8000 students. We have introduced new courses like Bengali Honours, B. Com (Eve).

- ♣ By 2020, we plan to have around 16,000 students. Our perspective plan has taken us to the rural sector. Raghabpur which is 22 Km from Kolkata, in the South 24 Parganas, is the location of our rural campus, the medium of instruction is Bengali.
- ♣ The Raghabpur Campus, which is the rural face of St. Xavier has, around 300 hundred students benefiting from our educational service.
- ♣ In April 2015, decision was taken to have a second campus for B. Com (Honours) students at St. Lawrence High School. 225 students took admission. Classes are to commence from July 2015.
- We also have plans of starting a campus in the EM Bypass where the EMMRC (Educational and Multi Media Research Centre) will be shifted. The EMRC (Educational and Multimedia Research Centre), SXC, Calcutta was established in 1986 for producing under graduate educational television programmes for the Countrywide Classrooms of the Government of India. The Center was rechristened as EMMRC (Educational and Multi Media Research Centre) in 2004 and in addition to producing television programmes, it also produces e-content. The basic objective of all these programmes is to update, upgrade and enrich the syllabi, especially in the rural and semi-urban areas of India. The programmes try to build awareness about the rich and varied culture and tradition of India. This center has won a total of 48 National Awards in different All India Competitions held over the years.
- ♣ Government of West Bengal has granted 17 acres of land to develop a University Campus at Rajarhat. Buildings are already coming up. We plan to start classes in July2017.

Teaching and learning: - There are three levels of plan: Academic perspective, Human Resource perspective, Infrastructural perspective. Currently the prioritized thrust areas are: -

 Extension of Masters Programmes of Study, which already exist in some Science Departments, the other Arts and Science Departments.



- Introducing Under Graduate Honours Programmes of study in some subjects like History. From 2015-16 academic session History as an Honours subject is being offered in the Raghabpur Campus, South 24 Parganas.
- University status, further collaborations with Foreign Universities and Indian counterparts.
- Promotion and extension of the rural campus at Raghabpur South 24 Parganas.
- Establishment of St. Xavier's Campus at St. Lawrence High School.
- Space taken over from the Jesuit residence in the Park Street campus to start a Centralized Research Facility.
- New structure within Park Street campus the Jubilee Buliding providing for more classrooms.
- The Hostel has been shifted to AJC Bose road, to make room for a centralized library and a B. Ed section.
- With the relocation of the Central Library the previous library space now provides for more cubicles for study and research of both students and faculty members.
- The Auditorium and the mini auditorium has been renovated and upgraded.

Research and Development: -

Utilization:

For research purpose:

The computational facility was used in developing in-house codes (Adaptive Mutation Simulated Annealing – Fortran code) and running some computational chemistry calculations. It greatly helped in making the computational research "in-house" reducing the requirement for collaboration to access computational facility outside the



College. The facility was useful for completing an ongoing collaborative research project (leading to a publication: "A new adaptive mutation simulated annealing algorithm: application to the study of pure and mixed Pt–Pd clusters", Authors: Shyamal Kumar Biring, <u>Rahul Sharma</u> and Pinaki Chaudhury, Journal: J Math Chem, Year: 2014, Volume: 52, Pages: 368–397, DOI: 10.1007/s10910-013-0268-y)

For student training:

Few of the students are conducting a project related to the elucidation of possible reaction mechanism for simple organic reactions using the Nudged Elastic Band (NEB) method as implemented in nwchem thereby gaining some experince in using quantum chemistry packages. Ground state potential energy surfaces were generated for some simple AB and AB2 like molecules and were demonstrated to undergraduate students of the Department of Chemistry to give them a better understanding about potential energy surfaces and reaction paths (which is a part of their Honours Final Semester curriculum)In the present restructured syllabus (effective from July 2013 session), project work has been introduced in the undergraduate 6th semester (effective January 2015 session) in the curriculum of all science departments where the computational facility would be extended to the students interested in computational/theoretical research projects.

- Community Engagement: St. Xavier's College involves all the stakeholders who come from the various sections of our community in its policy and strategy development. Opinions are sought and received through systematic and continuous feedback pattern.
- Human resource planning and development: Keeping in view the Vision and Mission of the College and given the fact that the ideological basis of Jesuit Education is to 'form men and women for others', the perspective plan for institutional development has two major thrust areas: academic and infrastructural. The plan for



academic development envisages increase in the number of postgraduate courses, and to enhance academic standards by curriculum restructuring, continuous improvement of teaching-learning methods, internal evaluation and examination reforms. Academic plans have to be supported by improvements / modernization of infrastructural facilities. These include increasing the number of class-rooms, equipping classrooms with audiovisual facilities, integration of computer labs, central computing facilities, building of hostels and new campuses, etc. Further there is a lot of emphasis on sports and cultural activities together with social service, NCC etc. Policies to promote the College programmes along the above lines are mainly finalized in the GB and AC. The plan for institutional development is made in consultation with the teachers at the initial level and subsequently with the Heads of Departments, senior faculty members, administrative heads and other stake holders. The eventual perspective is to become a unitary but Government linked University. A plan for establishing St. Xavier's University, Kolkata (SXUK) has been approved by the Governing Body of the College and submitted to MIC Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal on 18th October, 2012.

- The Management monitors and reviews the plans/projects implemented by holding formal and informal dialogues with the staff, from time to time.
- The Management encourages faculty members to participate in Orientation and Refresher courses, seminars and workshops. Teachers also present papers in National and International Conferences.

Teaching and Learning:

The college is practicing the method of 360-degree feedback. This feedback involves 4 domains - Principal, Peer, Self and Students. Feedback is then analyzed and a report is generated and is used for the proper evaluation of teaching and learning. The college management conducts regular interaction with the students through Student Parliament. This facilitates further promotion of the quality of teaching-learning.

Research and Development:

The spirit of innovation and experiment imbibed by the institution propels research and development. To add to it, the alertness of the faculty to avail financial aid offered by UGC, CSIR and other bodies boost the research activity and seek development.

Community Engagement:

The NSS in St. Xavier's furthers its vision and mission through propagation of Ignatian Culture in academics and other social perspectives. The strategies include more intense awareness campaign on social issues like a green-clean environment, gender sensitization, active participation during natural calamities like floods, tsunamis, earthquakes etc.



Human Resource Management:

St. Xavier's College adheres to the principle of rigorous discipline but with warm human touch. The administration has developed mechanisms to monitor each and every employee closely; at the same time, it ensures that he/she retains a comfort level, so that he/she can function utmost potential of his/her capacity.

Industry Interaction:

The Placement Cell along with various departments of the college develops ties with the industry at local, regional and national level. It provides significant information to the experts regarding new incorporation in the different courses of the college to meet the demands of the industry.

We have quality policy defined in the Jesuit document of the characteristics of Jesuit Education. St. Xavier's College as a part of the Society of Jesus, a Christian Religious order founded by St. Ignatius of Loyola in 1540, has been active in the field of education. The college aims at the integral, personal formation of youth. To accomplish this, special efforts are made: -

- To help the students to become mature, spiritually oriented Men and Women of Character.
- To encourage them continuously to strive after excellence in every field.
- To value and judiciously use their freedom.
- To be clear and firm on principles and courageous in action.
- To be unselfish in the service of their fellow men.
- To become agents of social change in their country.

The College thus aims at making its own contribution towards a transformation of the present day social condition so that principles of social justice, equality of opportunity, genuine free demand respect for religious and moral values, enshrined in the Constitution of India, may prevail and the possibility of living of fully human existence may be available to all.

The quality policy is defined in our Mission, Vision and Value Framework Statement.

The departmental objectives, are strategically evaluated in terms of quality, expansion, equity and excellence at the Governing Body meetings, the Academic Council meetings, Core Committee meetings, Departmental meetings and also at Vice Principals' forum.

Assessments are made annually at the Staff Sub Council meetings.

Strategic evaluation is also conducted by the Provincial at the Governing Body meetings.

6.2.5 How does the College ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder-relationship?

Complaint boxes are put in place for the Redressal of grievances. The complaints are analyzed and action taken if they turn out to be reasonable. The Disciplinary Committee takes up matters pertaining to complaints. Special committees are also



constituted to respond to outstanding issues concerning the dignity of the college. The Principal addresses the Students' grievance issues and forwards them to the respective Vice Principals for resolving them. However, the anonymous complaints are not entertained.

6.2.6 Does the College have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If yes, what was the institutional response?

Feedback links are incorporated in the college website where students may provide feedback on institutional performance. The feedback reports are automatically generated by software and reviewed by the Feedback Committee in details. Suggestions are noted and communicated to the Principal of the College.

The Academic Audit Committee consisting of senior teachers from the parent University collects feedback from students regarding teaching-learning process and other aspects of college functioning of the College.

6.2.7 In what way the affiliating University helped the College to identify the developmental needs of the College?

The University has its representatives in the College management and also in the Board of Studies of each department. Decisions taken in the College are approved in the Academic Council meetings where University representatives are present.

Identification of the developmental needs as suggested by the Academic Audit Team:

Teaching-Learning

- Restructuring syllabi with proper attention to the possibility of completing syllabi within the short time span (12 to 14 weeks) under semester system.
- Student-Teacher ratio in some of the courses like B. Com, BBA, Mathematics, Statistics, Economics are far more than the UGC norms.
- College involvement needed in helping students get internship for their project work. The department identifies internship as a part of the curriculum for certain programmes.
- Comprehensive lesson plans distributing equal emphasis on all topics.
- Classrooms are mostly equipped with Black Boards / White Boards. The traditional system as well as modern digital equipment's are used.
- The problem of Gas supply in Chemistry laboratory after 3 pm has been identified and addressed.
- Lack of integration of the ancillary subjects with the respective courses.
- For example, Mathematics for Chemistry course may be different from that of Mathematics for Statistics, or Computer Science or Physics. Thus a subject is to be pitched at different levels of study so that the students can relate the subject with their own course.
- Lack of entrepreneurial attitude among the students need to be addressed.



Examination / Evaluation System

- Involvement of considerable time (About 6 weeks) in conducting the examinations.
- System of having single external moderator with the possibility of having errors in the question papers may remain undetected, particularly in papers involving numerical problems, e.g., Accountancy, Costing, Taxation, Mathematics, Statistics etc.
- The problem of large number of arrear students in some courses needs to be addressed.

Infrastructure

- Integration of information system which will help in obtaining the required data from a centralized data capture station.
- More space for teaching-learning and administrative acts.

Alumni

Along with its existing contribution, it may facilitate developing entrepreneurial attitude and skill of the students through organizing different programmes in collaboration with the College, thus bringing about successful entrepreneurial interaction with the students as well as faculty.

Career Orientation

- The College can consider tie up with corporate entities who would provide real life projects for the interns. The process is expected to be mutually beneficial.
- Industry visits for the Science and Technology students for hand on experience would help them to focus on their respective goals setting.

Non-teaching Human Resources

- Administrative resources are required to be facilitated with the training and orientation programme with the advancement of technology and with the changed management policies.
- The resources associated with the laboratories are required to undergo formal study cum training sessions conducted by a pool of faculties.
- A reward and recognition programme might be planned for these resources tomotivate them for greater efficiency.
- A process of counselling and mentoring for these resources might yield further improvement.

SXC is an Autonomous College.

6.2.9 How does the College get feedback from non-teaching, teaching, parents and alumni on its functioning and how is it utilized?

Feedback links are incorporated in the college website where the stakeholders (non-teaching, teaching, parents and alumni) may provide feedback on institutional



performance. The feedback reports are automatically generated by a software and reviewed by Feedback Report Committee in details. Recommendations are noted and communicated to the Principal.

The Department conducts meetings with parents to evaluate and receive responses with regard to the academic and other development of the students. This helps the college in reviewing its policies and plans for the future.

- ♣ The faculty members communicate with the Vice Principal (of respective departments) diverse academic and administrative issues.
- ♣ The Non-Teaching staff members are permitted to interact directly with the Principal regarding administrative and other issues.

6.2.10 Does the College encourage autonomy to its academic departments and how does it ensure accountability?

Operational autonomy is provided to the departments to promote academic independence. The Member Secretary of the Academic Council in consultation with the COE, prepares the academic calendar of the College. The departments create their session plans based on the academic calendar. The departments also decide the teaching-learning methods to be used, for example, ICT techniques, or inclusion of projects in the curriculum, in consultation with their respective Board of Studies.

Thus, academic autonomy is encouraged through: -

- Framing of syllabus
- Conducting CIA (Continuous Internal Assessment)
- Bringing out departmental magazines
- Encouraging syllabus revision and improvement
- Encouraging seminars / workshops
- Invited Lectures

Accountability is ensured: -

Departments have to periodically report to the Vice Principals and Deans with regard to completion of syllabus, examination related work, departmental semester results and mentoring / tutoring of departmental students.

6.2.11 Does the College conduct performance auditing of its various departments?

Yes, an external academic audit is conducted on an annual basis. The audit team comprised of: -

(f) Departmental evaluations are conducted on annual basis with regard to teaching-learning process.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What efforts are made by the College to enhance the professional development of teaching and non-teaching staff?

The College organizes International and national seminars, workshops, conferences and Faculty Development Programmes for its staff as for the faculty of other institutions in the state.

The college management sanctions duty leaves to the faculty for attending seminars /conferences to keep them updated on the recent advancements in their respective fields.

Some awareness programmes on Legal Rights, Human Rights, Intellectual Property Rights and on Health related issues and practices have been held.

Planning and executing programmes that address professional development, career development, personal development of faculty members and support staff.

Encouraging faculty members to enroll for or provide resources for trainingprogrammes and workshops.

Sponsoring for participation in National and International Conferences, Seminars and Workshops.

The institution also has a requirement for each faculty to submit Continuous Professional Education details under which they are required to take courses or online webinars every year. The faculties are also encouraged to participate in the seminars and conferences effectively. The faculty evaluation model is in the similar form as UGC CAS which also requires the faculties to be engaged in professional development activities, failing which, the API scores are affected. The model is implemented for all faculties.

6.3.2 What is the outcome of the review of the Performance Appraisal Reports? List the major decisions.

- → The review of the performance appraisal facilitates the management to decide on the retention of the temporary faculty and upgrade their pay scales.
- ♣ New methods have also been incorporated for effective teaching learning.

- Faculty members who rate below 60% in the teacher evaluation report are required to meet Fr. Principal to discuss the outcome of the report.

- We have Finance Committee. Finance Committee prepares budget for every year and the same is being approved by the committee. Accordingly, various expenses are made.
- 4 At the end of every quarter reconciliation statement of budgeted Income and Expenditure is prepared and submitted to the Principal who monitors and regulates the same personally.
- → We have purchase committee. Before purchasing any major items, it is being approved by the committee.
- For major repair work we used to take quotations which is being scrutinized by the Minister's Office. After that it is being passed by the Principal.
- For any expenses up to Rs. 5000/- could be passed by any Vice Principal or Treasurer in respect of their own department. Any expenses beyond Rs. 5000/- voucher has to be passed by Principal. Each voucher is scrutinizing by the Principal's Office by "Pay Track" software system to avoid any double payment.
- ♣ Any cheque beyond Rs. 25,000/- must be signed by two signatories.
- For regular recurring expenses every department has submit the requisition slip for the approval of the Principal before purchase.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Does the College conduct an academic audit of its departments? If yes, give details.

Academic audit is conducted by the college, by a team of three - Academic Audit has been done by the outside experts (Ex-Principal of a Government College + Prof. of Calcutta University + Representative from Industry).

The departmental academic audit is done by the respective Boards of Studies. The Principal meets the departments at least once a semester for academic review. Sub Councils and Teachers Council review the academic functioning. The Core Committee conducts an academic audit regarding the performance of students in the semester examinations and also the performance trends. The Core Committee also reviews the entire evaluation system. The President of the Founder Body visits the College once a year and meets teaching/non-teaching staff individually or in groups to obtain feedback and compile a report on the overall academic functioning of the College.

Audit improves the quality of the institutional programmes. They are geared up toward their goals, for example the review of results brings out the low, average and high performance. Thereafter each student is taken care of according to her capacity.

Remedial courses are conducted for the weak students and special guidance help is provided to the high performers for the scholars' club.

Academic Audit has been done by the outside experts (Ex-Principal of a Government College and Prof. of Calcutta University and Representative from Industry).

On a regular basis, the Head of a department keeps track of the teaching-learning process through monthly departmental meetings as well as regular interactions with fellow faculty. Through various modes of Continuous Internal Assessment, the learning outcome of the students also gets reflected. Towards the end of the class schedule within a semester, the CIA performance of the students is assessed by the Vice Principals and Deans. Also, during the course of a semester the weak students are identified and adequately taken care of by the respective departments.

The final year students participate in an online teaching-learning evaluation pattern, reflecting the pros and cons of the entire system.

The Core Committee also reviews the entire teaching-learning system from time to time.

The IQAC and the Academic Council continuously reviews the teaching-learning process to ensure quality education is provided to the students. The IQAC also reviews:

The Continuous Internal Assessment helps teachers to identify the capable and slow learners in order to monitor their academic needs individually. Remedial classes are also organised for the weak and slow learners. The Students are motivated to think on their own which sharpens their critical acumen and original thinking. It also hones their analytical and interpretive skills. Regular interactions between faculty members and students beyond class hours improve the inter personal relations between teachers and students. The teachers can easily identify the improvement areas in the teaching learning domain in order to incorporate better methods of change.

The Foundation Course -

The Foundation Course introduced recently in the curriculum offers the students a panoramic exposure to newer methods of acquiring knowledge about society and environment, to foster a secular and democratic attitude, through such courses as Religious Studies and Personality Development.



The Context

- The diversity of student composition comprising advanced and slow learners poses a serious challenge to the level and content of the lectures. The teachers have to make a special effort to address and reach out to all cross sections of the class.
- Newer models of teaching have to be effectively devised in order to offer the students a holistic perspective on such subjects as Religious Studies, which requires an in depth understanding and research of complex issues. Creating secular awareness in multi-cultural society is what the course tries to ambitiously achieve.

Every faculty member and student participate in this transformation of the neighbourhood community.

For personal and spiritual development of students, various programmes and camps are organized by the Jesuits and their co-workers through NSS, AICUF, LTS and SC/ST cells.

The vision and mission of the College (which includes the best practices) is well defined and published through the College website and the College calendar which is



distributed to all the students and staff annually. However, practical difficulty with implementation arises when the diverse cross-section of students has to be dealt with. Students studying at St. Xavier's College come from varied backgrounds – culturally backward, academically weak, differently-abled minority students – who need special attention. Student Committees are formed to assess their own needs. Special grants are received from time to time from the UGC / MHRD to cater to the special needs of the minority and backward community students, which help in the implementation of the concrete action programmes throughout the year.

The institution educates its students to become 'Men and Women for others', with values of selflessness, sacrifice, honesty and humility with which they go out into the world conscious of their doing in the service of others.

- ➤ To extend the scope of the social and academic impact of Ignatian Charism, the rural campus and infrastructural facilities within the campus to set up more departments. In the process, the academic requirements of a larger cross-section of the rural community gets addressed.



- 1. College urgently needs more space (like class rooms, laboratories, sports facilities and other extension services) for expansion and development of academic activities.
 - » One floor has been added to the Boys Hostel of the Park Street Campus and the building housesthe Department of Education with its classrooms and laboratories and other requirements as per NCTEregulations 2014, conference rooms and the Central Library.An ICT room has been set up in the same building.
 - A new floor has been added in the Jubilee building for Multimedia Department with hall.
 - » In this process more classroomshave been created in the main building.
 - » The Central Research Facility has been created with FIST as well as College funds on the fourth floor in the space donated by the Jesuit community.
 - » A Smart classroom has been setup up on the fourth floor beside the Central Research Facility.
 - » We opened Fr. Arrupe Mini Auditorium with the capacity of 150 seats in the basement of the main auditorium.
 - We have Xavier hall on the first floor for seminars and conferences with a capacity of 200.
 - » The erstwhile Central Library has been converted into the Rohinton Kapadia Central Hall which houses classrooms, conferences / seminars, Placement Cell drives, and some offices. It is also used as a hall for conducting examinations.
 - » The laboratories have been modernized with FIST, DST and RUSA funds.
 - » A new campus as extension service centre has been setup in Raghabpur in South 24 Parganas, the rural face of St. Xavier's.
 - » For Raghabpur Campus we renovated the old hostel building and added one more floor.
 - » The St. Lawrence campus of St. Xavier's College has started classes from July 2015.
 - » The new building for EMMRC at EM Bypass campus is complete, the EMMRC will be shifted to the new venue by December, 2016.
 - » St. Xavier's has opened up two new hostels, one for boys (300 seats) and one for girls (200 seats) with fully equipped Gyms and other facilities.
 - » As per the vision 2020 we are opening up two new campuses, one in Rajarhat for St. Xavier's University and the other in EM Bypass for communication hub.

The Faculty members are encouraged to obtain their Ph. D degrees. The members are granted FDP leave. Professors who complete their Ph. Ds are honored and awarded by the College on the Convocation day.

From July 2010 – June 2015, 17 Professors have obtained Ph. D degrees.

The present number of Professors with Ph. D degrees is 77.

39 teachers are pursuing their Ph. Ds.

4. Research Culture to be intensified in Arts, Humanities, Social Sciences and Education.

Research Projects have been taken up by the faculty members of Arts, Humanities, Social Sciences and Education. Since July 2010,4 projects were initiated.

Faculties have been encouraged and urged to write research papers on a regular basis.

Sucharita Karali and Soumen Biswas from BA General, and Pratik Makhal and Satindrabati Naru from Bengali Honours – are the students who teach the village children and help them to gain self-confidence. The students also participated in a college camp organised by NSS which took place in the month of October to construct the road from the College campus to Gobrachalk.

The faculty by participating in various seminars and conferences are also enriching themselves with appropriate knowledge and expertise.

FOUNDATION COURSE: A BRIEF INTRODUCTION

This is not achieved by mere increment of knowledge but actual inculcation of ethical values.

Therefore the Course provides a strong basis for over-all positive growth of students in their emotional, inter-personal, spiritual and ethical spheres. The Foundation Courses are designed to address each of these aspects in a systematic manner. They will function as the foundation of all other courses irrespective of subjects students may study and the specialization they may be interested in. The Foundation courses will touch upon the core skills and essential values students will require once they leave the four protective walls of classrooms. Therefore, these courses will function as 'the foundation for school of life for the personality formation of the students'.


- Poor economic background of the students which is one of the major causes for the dropouts as they have to earn for their families.

34. How does the department ensure that programme objectives are constantly met and learning outcomes monitored?



38. Detail any five Strength, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Challenges (SWOC) of the department:

Strength

The strength of the commerce department of St. Xavier's College lies in its past and present faculty. The department has to its credit a renowned team of former teachers who came from academics, industry and legal professions. The overlapping generations of students and teachers over the last 60 years of the existence of commerce department formed the building block of the soft infrastructure of the department. The department maintains close contacts with the corporate leaders and seeks their views and inputs at the time of curriculum and syllabus revision. The department regularly organizes seminars, symposiums and talks by eminent people to create a platform for continuous academic discourse and exchange of ideas with the outside world.

Weakness

The primary problem that the department faces in its expansionary programme is physical infrastructural bottlenecks. The College has already taken up the task of addressing the infrastructure gap in three ways:

<u>First</u>, shifting a large amount of space from the Jesuits Father's enclave to the College. <u>Second</u>, rationalization of existing physical facilities, like shifting the library and B. Ed department from the main building.

<u>Third</u>, the B. Com. (Evening) department has added three more class rooms by making utilization of the physical infrastructure of the St. Lawrence School Campus.

Given the physical and soft infrastructure, a strong network of Alumni across the globe and post-graduate department of commerce the department is rightly placed to set up a full fledged research wing perhaps in collaboration with the chambers of commerce and corporate houses.



39. Future Plans of the department:

- (i) The college has recently received approval for Ph.d. programme in the commerce department. This will give opportunity to the departmental faculties to act as research guides in future. Moreover with the introduction of Ph.D programme, the department plans to undertake more minor and major research projects.

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


